The Transportation Agency contracted with Michael Baker International to complete performance audits required by the Transportation Development Act for Monterey-Salinas Transit and for TAMC. Both agencies have satisfactorily complied with applicable performance measures. The auditor recommended that the Transportation Agency work with MST to update the roster of the Mobility Advisory Committee to list members that meet the required social service categories as listed in the Transportation Development Act, and to continue developing baseline metrics for the Agency's Transportation Demand Management program. The auditor also recommended that TAMC maintains on file evidence of the submission of TDA performance audits to Caltrans.

BICYCLE, PEDESTRIAN, TRANSIT, and SOCIAL SERVICES

The Salinas Valley Safe Routes to School Plan will include project recommendations for all public K-12 schools in the cities of Gonzales, Soledad, Greenfield, and King City. Project prioritization is determined through a democratic process, called Participatory Budgeting, where community members vote to decide how public funds are spent in their cities. The third city to complete the Participatory Budgeting process is King City.

3.2.2. 4. FORTAG Canyon Del Rey - Construction Contract:

On December 15, 2023, the Agency published bid documents for qualified contractors to construct the Canyon Del Rey segment of the Fort Ord Regional Trail and Greenway (FORTAG) project. The project includes the construction of a 1.8 mile segment of the 28 mile FORTAG paved multi-use recreation trail project. On February 15, 2024, TAMC held a bid opening and received four bids.

4. <u>EMPLOYEE OF THE QUARTER</u>

On behalf of the Board of Directors and staff of the Transportation Agency for Monterey County, Presented the Transportation Agency Employee of the Quarter to Theresa Wright.

The Agency recognized Theresa Wright for her professionalism and her diligence in handling media coverage, writing news releases, and preparing the weekly Cone Zone Construction Report. Most notably, employees appreciate her outstanding job coordinating public outreach efforts for the Scenic Highway 68 project, the US 101 South of Salinas project, and the Highway 1 Elkhorn Slough project.

5. <u>UNMET TRANSIT NEEDS</u>

The Board of Directors received a presentation on the unmet transit needs process and held a public hearing, there were no comments, Chair Lopez closed the public hearing.

Aaron Hernandez, Transportation Planner, presented on the unmet needs process associated with the Local Transportation Fund (LTF), which is one of two designated funding sources for public transit created by the California Transportation Development Act (TDA). As Monterey-Salinas Transit District members, every city in the county allocates its annual fund apportionment to Monterey-Salinas Transit for public transit services.

Prior to allocating these transit funds, the Agency is required to provide for a public hearing and outreach to identify unmet transit needs. Because the Transportation Agency no longer allocates transit funds to local streets and roads, the Agency is no longer required to adopt a finding on unmet transit needs. However, the Agency continues to solicit public input on unmet transit needs and places comments into the following categories:

- Transit service improvement requests that would improve an existing service.
- Transit service expansion requests that extend a transit route beyond its current limits and fill a gap in service.
- Capital improvement projects that would enhance existing public transit facilities.

All comments are reviewed with Monterey-Salinas Transit staff to consider options to implement requests and to evaluate comments based on the Unmet Transit Needs Criteria and time frame in which unmet transit needs can be met. The unmet transit needs comments list serves as a public input tool for the Transportation Agency's short- and long-term transit planning and improvements.

The Transportation Agency's deadline for accepting public comments and questionnaires for the consideration as part of the annual unmet transit needs process is April 30, 2024.

6. FEDERAL LEGISLATIVE UPDATE - COMMUNITY FUNDING PROJECT

The Board of Directors of the Transportation Agency for Monterey County discussed and provided direction to staff related to possible community funding project nominations for federal appropriations funding for the following projects:

- Elkhorn Slough Highway 1 climate resiliency project planning and environmental phase, in Representative Jimmy Panetta's district
- King City Multimodal Station project, in Representative Zoe Lofgren's district

Christina Watson, Director of Planning, reported that March is the deadline for project nominations for the fiscal year 2025 federal appropriations bill. Projects must be eligible for federal funding and must be able to obligate the funds, get the project under contract by 2028 and expend the funds by 2032. Successful requests for funding typically fully fund a phase of the project, so it helps if the project, or a phase of the project, is already mostly funded. It is possible to submit more than one project for this funding.

The Elkhorn Slough Highway 1 climate resiliency project secured a \$1 million state allocation from Assembly Member Dawn Addis and State Senator John Laird. TAMC staff applied for federal and state grant funding to complete a Preliminary Environmental Linkages report, the first step towards federal and state environmental clearance, and to develop a Project Initiation Document with Caltrans. A federal earmark would help the project complete those phases of work and get the project ready to move into the Project Approval and Environmental Document phase.

The King City Multimodal Station project has secured approximately \$14 million from state funds and \$5 million from Amtrak and is seeking federal Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) funding to fully fund construction of the platform and track improvements in King

City. A federal earmark would help the project complete the National Environmental Policy Act review required for federal funding.

7. SAND CITY BIKE TRAIL AND PARKING PROPOSAL

M/S/C Askew/LeBarre/unanimous

Board directed staff to coordinate with Sand City on considerations for a possible future use agreement for an alignment of a trail that avoids conflict with future mass transit users and for fair market value lease agreements for non-trail uses such as parking.

The Board received a presentation on the Sand City bike trail and parking proposal from Zane Mortensen, Sand City's interim City Planner. He reported that the proposal seeks to create a one-mile segment of multi-use trail and two parking areas within the TAMC-owned Monterey Branch Line rightof-way. The proposal promises that the "proposed multi-use trail will take into consideration the future use of the TAMC corridor for rail and/or bus transit and would not obstruct any of the existing rail infrastructure" and would "minimize conflict with the existing property leases." Sand City was awarded a \$250,000 Monterey Bay Air Resources District AB2766 Clean Vehicle Program grant to support planning and design.

Director Muck noted that we currently have leases revenue that we use to keep the Monterey Branch Line right of way clean. He noted that all our leases can be cancelled with appropriate notification when the property is needed for transportation uses. Board Member Askew expressed her support for the project, noting Sand City's proposals will be consistent with our vision for rail on the corridor. Ms. Askew also noted Sand City's planned growth is significant and trail connections and the SURF! busway would be beneficial to support higher population density in this area.

Public comment:

Eric Petersen, Salinas resident, commented he hopes this project follows the Caltrans Manual and avoids chip sealing for bicyclists.

Scott Donaldson, City of Del Rey Oaks, emphasized the importance of public outreach.

8. DRAFT OVERALL WORK PROGRAM, BUDGET, AND INTEGRATED FUNDING STRATEGY

M/S/C Alejo/Askew/unanimous

The Board of Directors received a presentation on the Draft Overall Work Program, Budget, and Integrated Funding Strategy, and:

- 1. Authorized the Executive Director to submit the draft fiscal year 24/25 Overall Work Program to Caltrans for initial review;
- Provided direction and guidance to staff on the three-year budget for fiscal years 24/25 through 26/27, the Overall Work Program for fiscal year 24/25, and the 2024 Integrated Funding Strategy; and
- 3. Directed the Executive Director to bring the final three-year budget, one-year Overall Work Program, and the 2024 Integrated Funding Strategy back to the Board on May 22, 2024 for approval.

Mike Zeller, Director of Programming & Project Delivery, reviewed the annual Overall Work Program and Integrated Funding Strategy which describes the activities to be accomplished during the fiscal year beginning July 1 and ending June 30. After the draft Overall Work Plan is approved, staff will submit it to Caltrans for feedback. Agency staff then incorporates comments from Caltrans into to a final proposed Overall Work Program to be presented to the Board in May with the fiscal year 2024/25 budget.

Jeff Kise, Director of Finance & Administration, reported that the Agency budget separates expenditures into operating and direct programs. Operating expenditures include salaries and benefits, materials and supplies, and equipment, noting staff is including a 3.8% cost of living increase to keep pace with inflation and stay competitive with other agencies.

Public comment:

Rita Goel, Salinas resident, expressed concerns and had questions about the specifics in the budget.

9. <u>REPORTS FROM TRANSPORTATION PROVIDERS</u>

Caltrans District 5 – Orchid Monroy Ochoa, highlighted Caltrans District 5 construction, road closures, and repairs:

- Repairs have been started on the Dolan Slide on Highway 1, possibly opening on March 8th.
- The Paul Slide on Highway 1 is targeted to fully open in late spring.
- In Monterey Counties, Near Big Sur, Limekiln Creek Bridge to south of Castro Canyon Bridge Storm Damage Repairs have started.

Monterey Regional Airport District – Carl Miller announced the following:

- The airport is proceeding with their new terminal; the plans are going as scheduled.
- The airport has 300,000 passengers per year and hopes to increase and add additional service in the future.

Monterey Salinas Transit District – Michelle Overmeyer announced the following:

• MST held a bus driver skills course event and had an on -site recruitment for coach operators, and made 23 contingent job offers, looking forward to being fully staffed soon.

Monterey Bay Air Resources District – No Report this month.

10. <u>REPORTS ON MEETINGS ATTENDED BY BOARD MEMBERS AT AGENCY EXPENSE</u>

Board member LeBarre attended the CALCOG Regional Leadership Forum in Monterey on February 7, and Board members LeBarre and Potter Coast Rail Coordinating Council (CRCC) Policy Meeting in Oakland on February 16.

Executive Director Todd Muck announced the following:

- Next TAMC Board meeting will be held at the Government Center, Cayenne Conference Room, 1441 Schilling Place.
- Bill Reichmuth, former TAMC Executive Director and City of Monterey Public Works Director has passed; Bill's funeral service will be at the Carmel Mission on April 17, 10 am.

12. ANNOUNCEMENTS AND/OR COMMENTS

Board member Alejo commended the Safe Routes to School Program's partnership with the City of Salinas to install two roundabouts to help the flow of traffic near Bardin Elementary.

Colleen Courtney, Alternate, commented on behalf of Board Member Adams to thank staff for the Toro Park homeowners meeting.

The Transportation Agency contracted with Michael Baker International to complete performance audits required by the Transportation Development Act for Monterey-Salinas Transit and for TAMC. Both agencies have satisfactorily complied with applicable performance measures. The auditor recommended that the Transportation Agency work with MST to update the roster of the Mobility Advisory Committee to list members that meet the required social service categories as listed in the Transportation Development Act, and to continue developing baseline metrics for the Agency's Transportation Demand Management program. The auditor also recommended that TAMC maintains on file evidence of the submission of TDA performance audits to Caltrans.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The transit performance audits have been completed at a cost of \$31,798 using Local Transportation Funds budgeted for this purpose.

DISCUSSION:

The California Legislature enacted the Transportation Development Act (TDA) of 1971 to improve existing public transportation services and encourage regional transportation coordination. Caltrans administers the TDA through each county's regional transportation planning agency. As the regional transportation planning agency for Monterey County, the Transportation Agency is responsible for administering the county's TDA funds, which includes authorizing funding to local transportation agencies for the purposes outlined in the Act, and conducting an annual unmet transit needs assessment.

The Transportation Development Act provides two major sources of funding for public transportation in California. The first, the Local Transportation Fund, is derived from a 1/4 cent of the general sales tax collected statewide. The second, the State Transit Assistance fund, is derived from the statewide sales tax on diesel fuel.

The Transportation Agency submits transit performance audits to the state every three years pursuant to the Transportation Development Act. The performance audits evaluate the efficiency and effectiveness, as defined in the Caltrans Performance Audit Guidebook, of Monterey-Salinas Transit, which is the county's sole public transit provider, and TAMC, which serves as the Local Transportation Fund administrator.

Generally, the audits review each operator's financial and operating reports to determine compliance with state operating requirements. The audit also determines compliance with administrative requirements, including timely submittal of required financial documentation, farebox recovery requirements, and a review of operating costs, among other indicators. Any recommendations to correct findings identified in the audits, or improvements needed by each operator to enhance the performance and cost-effectiveness of their respective transit services, must be implemented in the next three-year audit period.

The Transportation Agency and Monterey-Salinas Transit have satisfactorily complied with applicable performance measures. Copies of the complete TAMC and MST audits are available for review as **web attachments** to this report.

The audit recommendations for the Transportation Agency are listed below:

- 1. Maintain on file evidence of submission of TDA performance audits to Caltrans.
- Work closely with Monterey-Salinas Transit to update the Mobility Advisory Committee (MAC) bylaws to include a table that aligns MAC membership with the statutory composition of the Social Services Transportation Advisory Committee.
- 3. Continue to develop baseline metrics for transportation demand management (TDM), particularly in light of the shift to a Community-Based Social Marketing (CBSM) approach.

The audit recommendations for Monterey-Salinas Transit are listed below:

1. Work closely with TAMC to update the Mobility Advisory Committee (MAC) bylaws to include a table that aligns MAC membership with the statutory composition of the Social Services Transportation Advisory Committee.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

City of King - Participatory Budgeting Funding Request:

- 1. **APPROVE** the request by the City of King to program RSTP funds dedicated to the City's Participatory Budgeting process;
- 2. **APPROVE** amending Exhibit A of the local funding agreement to include these projects and funding.

SUMMARY:

The Salinas Valley Safe Routes to School Plan will include project recommendations for all public K-12 schools in the cities of Gonzales, Soledad, Greenfield, and King City. Project prioritization is determined through a democratic process, called Participatory Budgeting, where community members vote to decide how public funds are spent in their cities. The third city to complete the Participatory Budgeting process is King City.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The Salinas Valley Safe Routes to School Plan is funded through a \$664,127 Caltrans Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant and \$126,501 of Measure X Safe Routes to School Program funds as is reflected in the approved agency budget. The projects selected through the Participatory Budgeting process are funded by \$1 million (\$250,000 for four cities) in Regional Surface Transportation Program Reserve funds from the fiscal year 20/21-22/23 program cycle.

DISCUSSION:

The Participatory Budgeting process is designed to fast-track funding and implementation of safe routes to school projects that are meaningful to community members. In April 2023, a King City Safe Routes to School Steering Committee was formed to assist in developing the process and engaging the greater community. Sixteen community members served on the Committee and, on average, 8 members attended at least 4 of the 8 steering committee meetings.

The Process:

- 1. <u>Creating the Ballot</u> the King City Safe Routes to School Steering Committee, made up of residents and community advocates, worked with Safe Routes to School program partners and the City of King to develop a list of projects for the community to vote on.
- 2. Election Kickoff the Election kicked-off at the Dia de los Muertos Festival on Octobor 29,

2023 where the public had an opportunity to learn about the projects, ask questions, and cast their vote.

- 3. <u>Voting</u> The public was able to vote for their favorite projects for a two and a half week period (Octobor 27 November 12) at ballot drop-off sites or online.
- 4. <u>Election Results</u> the winning projects were announced at the February 27, 2024 King City Council meeting.

Election Results:

The ballot included 2 proposals, with each proposal having a list of street safety projects on corridors that received a high interest in comments during the Safe Routes to School Plan public outreach and that were prioritized by the Steering Committee. During the two and a half voting period, a total of 755 community members voted for their favorite projects. Of those 755 ballots, 324 ballots were in Spanish, 722 were paper and 33 were submitted online.

After the ballots were collected and counted, the Steering Committee reviewed the election results and recommended to City Council that the following projects be funded to make the most of the \$250,000 grant from the Transportation Agency (full list of projects linked below). On February 27, 2024, the King City Council approved the recommendation to implement the following projects:

The Transportation Agency Master Funding Agreement memorializes conditions and requirements for local agencies to use state funds passed through by the Transportation Agency for Monterey County. Each agency receiving Regional Surface Transportation Program, Regional Development Impact Fee, and Transportation Development Act 2% funds are required to enter into a master agreement. Exhibit A is the approved list of projects to receive funding from the Transportation Agency.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

APPROVE proposed amendments to the Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities Advisory Committee bylaws, which the board noticed at the February 2024 Board meeting, to add a clause about BPC Members' responsibility to be a bridge to their jurisdictions overseeing local bicycle and pedestrian facility-related needs and developments.

SUMMARY:

The Transportation Agency is proposing an update to its bylaws by adding a clause to the Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities Advisory Committee bylaws under Section V, Membership Responsibility. According to TAMC bylaws, proposed amendments must be noticed at the Board of Directors meeting preceding the final approval, which requires approval by at least two-thirds (2/3) of the voting members present.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

None.

DISCUSSION:

On November 1, 2023, the Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities Advisory Committee (BPC) reviewed their bylaws, prompted by a presentation from Janneke Strause, Transportation Planner at TAMC. Ms. Strause's presentation highlighted the formation of the Citizens Advisory Committee for Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities, underscoring TAMC's commitment to meet State and Federal mandates for community involvement. She outlined key responsibilities such as evaluating urban planning updates and advocating for bicycle and pedestrian enhancements in new developments to the TAMC Board of Directors.

Martin Wegenstein, District 5 rep acting as 2023 Vice Chair and 2024 Chair, encouraged committee members to collaborate with local officials on future projects that include bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure. Following this, the committee unanimously agreed to amend the bylaws, specifically by adding a clause in Section V on Membership Responsibilities, to underscore committee members' roles as pivotal links between their jurisdictions and the advisory committee. To conduct a detailed review, an ad-hoc subcommittee was established, comprising Martin Wegenstein, Mark Chaffey, and Marzette Henderson. The BPC discussed the proposed edits at the January 10, 2024 meeting and unanimously recommended the TAMC Board adopt the changes. The TAMC Board noticed the Bylaws change at its February 28, 2024 meeting.

The revised bylaws are **attached**, with the relevant changes marked on page 3.

BICYCLE AND PEDESTRIAN FACILITIES ADVISORY COMMITTEE BYLAWS

Approved by the TAMC Board on [month day, year]

The Transportation Agency for Monterey County (TAMC) has established a Citizens Advisory Committee for Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities to act at its direction and discretion, in response to state and federal requirements for citizens' participation.

I. <u>PURPOSE AND DUTIES</u>

The purpose and duties of the Committee are as follows:

- A. Advise the Transportation Agency for Monterey County on safety, community needs, concerns, goals, and objectives with respect to bicycle and pedestrian facilities and travel. Special reports related to the bicycle and pedestrian planning effort may be made to the TAMC at any time.
- B. Review local bicycle and pedestrian facility planning documents.
- C. Review bicycle and pedestrian project funding applications submitted to TAMC and recommend a priority project list in each funding cycle.
- D. Advocate bicycle use and walking as viable alternative means of transportation.
- E. Identify future areas for short and long-term improvement strategies for the development of bicycle and pedestrian facilities.

- F. Operate as a forum for communication between public and private agencies, users, and providers.
- G. Provide advice on the development of a countywide Bicycle Plan that meets the criteria for a General Bikeway Plan as set forth in the California Bikeways Act.

II. <u>MEMBERSHIP</u>

The Committee shall be composed of one representative and one alternate from each city and supervisorial district in Monterey County. The TAMC Board may appoint additional members from public agencies. Interested individuals may obtain application forms from TAMC staff. Individuals must be nominated for membership by the city or supervisorial district and must be approved by the TAMC Board.

III. OFFICERS AND TERM OF OFFICE

The Committee shall have officers, a Chairperson and a Vice Chairperson, who shall be elected by the general membership of the Committee.

The term of office shall be for one (1) year. Election of officers shall be held in November of each year and will take effect in January of the following year. Upon the resignation of an officer, a special election will be held.

The Chairperson shall preside over all committee meetings, may vote on all matters, appoint subcommittees, and call special meetings. The Chairperson shall report to the TAMC as directed by the Committee.

The Vice Chairperson shall serve in the absence of the Chairperson and perform such other duties as requested by the Chair. In the event the Chairperson or Vice Chairperson are not present at the meeting, the Committee may select a member to chair that particular meeting.

IV. <u>TERM OF MEMBERSHIP</u>

Committee members will serve two (2) years with the option of additional terms. TAMC staff will notify members thirty (30) days in advance of their term expiration date. Members must advise TAMC staff as to their desire to stay on the Committee. Reappointment must be confirmed by the TAMC.

Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities Advisory Committee Bylaws Adopted [month day, year]

V. <u>MEMBERSHIP RESPONSIBILITY</u>

Committee members are the active link between the jurisdiction they represent and the the Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities Advisory Committee. The Committee member shall communicate regularly with the governance organizations and communities within their jurisdiction, track needs, projects, and improvements that may affect Bicycle and Pedestrian facilities, and make recommendations for full committee review as needed. TAMC staff can support such contact.

VI. <u>ATTENDANCE</u>

Attendance at all Committee meetings is expected. Members who miss three (3) Meetings within a twelve (12) month period without due cause shall have their appointment automatically terminated. "Due cause" is defined as calling the TAMC secretary in advance of the meeting with a reason for not attending.

VII. <u>QUORUM</u>

For the Committee to transact any business or take action, a quorum must be present. A quorum of the Committee shall consist of a majority of the number of voting memberships filled at that time; the existence of any vacancies shall not be counted for purposes of establishing a quorum. (Voting members are defined above in paragraph II. Membership.)

VIII. <u>MEETINGS</u>

Meetings shall be held at a specific time and place that the Committee determines to be convenient for the majority of the members. Meetings shall be open to the public and shall conform to the Open Meeting Laws, commonly known as the Ralph M. Brown Act (California Government Code 54950 et seq.). The time allotted for the public to present their view to the Committee on bicycle and pedestrian issues will be determined by the Chair in order to ensure that Committee business is completed.

IX. <u>MINUTES</u>

The minutes of the meetings will be kept by the TAMC staff and approved by the Committee. When votes are taken on items or opinions to be presented to the TAMC, a roll call vote will be taken, and the results clearly documented in the minutes. The minutes shall reflect minority views in addition to the majority viewpoint.

X. <u>VOTING</u>

The vote of the majority of the Committee members present at any regular, continued or special meeting shall be sufficient to pass or act upon any matter properly before the Committee.

XI. <u>COMMUNICATIONS</u>

The Committee may communicate freely with elected or appointed bodies, public or private agencies or individuals to obtain input or opinions regarding bicycle and pedestrian planning proposals. Copies of all correspondence originating with the Committee should be included, as it occurs, in the TAMC and Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) agenda packets.

XII. STAFF ASSISTANCE

Staff shall assist in providing information, preparing meeting agendas as directed, and generally assisting the Committee. Members of the staff will be present at all meetings.

Review of reports or proposals, preparation of draft written communications, verbal or personal contacts with individual agencies and other related activities shall be done by the Committee as a whole or by Subcommittees.

XIII. <u>AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS</u>

The bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting of the Committee by a majority of the voting membership of the Committee, provided that written notice of the proposed amendment is mailed to each member of the Committee not less than one (1) week prior to the meeting.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Legislative Update:

- 1. RECEIVE update on state and federal legislative issues; and
- 2. ADOPT positions on proposed legislation.

SUMMARY:

This report presents updates on state and federal legislative activities and proposed positions on draft legislation.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The state legislative proposals may have a financial impact on TAMC if they are enacted. The 2024 federal transportation appropriations bill included \$1,811,000 for the G12 Pajaro to Prunedale project. TAMC submitted funding requests to Senator Butler for \$2 million for the Elkhorn Slough Highway 1 Climate Resiliency project and \$1.5 million for the King City Multimodal Transportation Center by the March 12, 2024 deadline.

DISCUSSION:

Attachment 1 is the draft state bill list. Priorities listed in the bill list refer to the adopted 2024 legislative program, online as a **web attachment**. The Executive Committee recommends the Board adopt the following positions:

- Assembly Bill (AB) 817 (Pacheco): Open meetings: teleconferencing: subsidiary body this is one of two Brown Act reform bills that could help TAMC have more flexibility on its committee meetings. Recommend a "support" position.
- AB 2535 (Bonta): Trade Corridor Enhancement Program would require the California Transportation Commission (CTC) to ensure that at least 50% of the funds allocated under the Trade Corridor Enhancement Program in any fiscal year are allocated to investments in zeroemission freight infrastructure and would prohibit funding any capacity projects or general purposes lanes on the state highway system. The US 101 South of Salinas project is poised to apply for this grant program but would not be eligible with these revisions to the program. Recommend an "oppose" position.
- AB 3005 (Wallis): Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax Law: adjustment suspension this is a reintroduction of a bill from prior years that would severely impact the main funding source for transportation in California, the gas tax. Recommend an "oppose" position.

- Senate Bill (SB) 537 (Becker): Open meetings: multijurisdictional, cross-county agencies: teleconferences this is the other Brown Act reform bill; this one could facilitate virtual meetings of multijurisdictional bodies such as the Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments and the Coast Rail Coordinating Council. Recommend a "support" position.
- SB 768 (Caballero): California Environmental Quality Act: Air Resources Board: vehicle miles traveled: study would require the State Air Resources Board (ARB) to coordinate with relevant agencies, including Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPAs), to conduct a study on how vehicle miles traveled is used as a metric for measuring transportation impacts pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Recommend a "support" position.

The Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities Advisory Committee recommends the Board support AB 2259 (Boerner): Transportation: bicycle safety handbook, which would require the California State Transportation Agency (CalSTA) to develop and distribute a bicycle safety handbook that includes information on existing laws regulating bicycles and e-bikes.

The Monterey Bay Air Resources District requests the Board support AB 2401 (Ting): Clean Cars 4 All Program, which would expand the grant program to the entire state, including Monterey County.

TAMC may need to pursue legislation to clarify project eligibility for Proposition 116 funding, which was used to purchase the Monterey Branch Line in 2003. The MST SURF! Busway and Bus Rapid Transit project, as currently designed, removes small portions of the tracks in three places. Due to the removal of tracks, some are questioning the Agency's commitment to the ultimate build-out project of light rail in the corridor. However, the tracks are expected to be refurbished and upgraded for the eventual rail project anyway, and the removal of a minor section of the corridor is not a barrier to implementing future rail service.

The TAMC Board demonstrated an ongoing commitment to passenger rail on the Monterey Branch Line via adoption of the Monterey Bay Area Network Integration Study on August 25, 2021. The vision service scenario shows a passenger rail service on the Monterey Branch Line, connecting "around the bay" to the Santa Cruz Branch Line, enabling a one-seat ride from the City of Monterey to the City of Santa Cruz in the full build-out scenario and connecting to intercity passenger service on the coast rail line at the community of Castroville. The initial service scenario shows TAMC's support for the Monterey-Salinas Transit (MST) SURF! Busway and Bus Rapid Transit project within the TAMC-owned Monterey Branch Line corridor as a precursor to rail service. The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) recommended the TAMC Board pursue bus rapid transit service to demonstrate demand for rail service on the corridor. As a result, the TAMC Board approved the SURF! project in its Measure X local transportation sales tax ballot measure in 2016. Thanks to Measure X and Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP) grant funding, the SURF! project is now at 95% design and is ready to go into construction in 2025, once the required permits have been approved.

Attachment 2 is a state legislative update; **Attachment 3** is a summary of a Legislative Analyst's Office report on the impacts of climate change goals on transportation funding options.

Attachment 4 is a federal legislative update, celebrating the enactment of the transportation appropriations bill that included \$1,811,000 for the G12 Pajaro to Prunedale project. **Web Attachment 2** is a summary of President Biden's budget request and its implications for transit and rail projects, from the American Public Transportation Association.

General Outlook

The 2024 Calendar states that August 31 will be the final day of the 2023-24 Legislative Session. The legislature is currently going through its budget subcommittee process to take public comment on the Governor's proposed FY 24-25 State Budget. Items will remain open without action until the May Revise is released on or by May 14. The State Budget must be enacted by the legislature on June 15 and signed by the Governor by June 30. Governor Newsom will have until September 30 to sign or veto legislation.

New Senate President pro Tempore

On February 5, Senator Mike McGuire was sworn in as the 52nd President pro Tempore of the California State Senate. He succeeds Toni Atkins, who served as pro Temp since 2018 but will be termed out of office this year. She intends to run for Governor in 2026 when Governor Newsom is termed out. McGuire will be termed out in 2026.

Monterey Branch Line – Use of Proposition 116 Funds

Proposition 116 of 1990 enacted the Clean Air and Transportation Improvement Act, designating \$1.99 billion for specific projects, purposes, and geographic jurisdictions, primarily for passenger rail capital projects. TAMC received \$17 million to extend Caltrain service and address other rail projects. TAMC elected to use \$9.3 million of the total to acquire the Monterey Branch Line corridor from Castroville to Seaside in 2003. TAMC adopted light rail as the preferred alternative in 2009 and commenced coordination with the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) on the environmental review. In 2013, the FTA asked TAMC to work with MST to pursue a near-term bus rapid transit project in the corridor to prove ridership demand for a passenger rail service. In 2016, TAMC included the MST SURF! Busway and Bus Rapid Transit project in the Measure X investment plan, approved by 67.71% of voters. In 2022, Monterey-Salinas Transit was awarded a \$25 million grant by the California State Transportation Agency for the SURF! project. The project, scheduled to commence construction in October 2024, would construct a dedicated busway between Marina and Seaside in the TAMC-owned Monterey Branch Line right-of-way to bypass traffic on Highway 1. The project will reduce travel time during peak morning and afternoon congested periods and connect the rapidly growing housing centers in the City of Marina with commercial and hospitality jobs on the Monterey Peninsula.

The California Transportation Commission is concerned about the SURF! project removing existing tracks since it may violate the use of funds for the Monterey Branch Line as permitted through Proposition 116. The existing tracks, however, are decades old, need replacement, and are in no condition to service passenger rail service today. Considerable investment is needed to complete environmental clearance and project design, construct upgrades to the tracks, procure rolling stock, and secure operating funds for the planned passenger rail service. Consistent with the Governor's Climate Action Plan for Transportation Infrastructure, the SURF! project will help support mode shift and prove ridership demand while funding is secured for the passenger rail service. Legislative action may be required to clear up any ambiguity and retain the \$25 million award for the SURF! project as well as the original Proposition 116 investment into the rail corridor.

New California Transportation Commissioner

On February 1, Assembly Speaker Rivas appointed Robert Tiffany, former San Benito County Supervisor, to the California Transportation Commission. Mr. Tiffany succeeds Joseph Lyou, Executive Director for the Coalition for Clean Air, previously appointed by former Speaker Anthony Rendon. It is the first time a member from the California coast has been selected. The CTC consists of 11 members, including nine gubernatorial appointees, and one each by the Senate President pro Tempore (Clarissa Falcon of San Diego) and the Assembly Speaker. Mr. Tiffany will attend his first Commission meeting in San Jose on March 21-22.

Addressing Transportation Funding Gaps: Strategies and Options

Introduction:

California's leadership in climate change mitigation is marked by ambitious initiatives to cut greenhouse gas emissions, notably through promoting Zero-Emission Vehicles (ZEVs) and reducing Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT). These efforts bring to light a fiscal dilemma as they forecast a shrinking revenue stream from the traditional transportation funding sources of gasoline and diesel taxes. This shift comes as the state faces reduced revenue from the gas tax, which has been the main source of transportation funding since the 1920s, intensifying the need for innovative funding solutions. The emergence of teleworking and more fuel-efficient cars have also exacerbated funding decline. The Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) published a report outlining the challenges of balancing environmental aspirations with fiscal realities considering California's budget deficit and providing guidance in evaluating sustainable funding options.¹ It aims to ensure transportation infrastructure can continue to develop without compromising environmental goals or fiscal responsibility, offering a pathway for strategic decision-making.

Background:

California's Climate Initiatives and Scoping Plan: In response to climate change, Governor Newsom has issued two Executive Orders, N-19-19 and N-79-20, which are intended to promote mode shift and investments in active and public transportation rather than traditional highway projects, while promoting the increase of ZEV adoption, mandating 100% of new light-duty vehicle sales to be ZEVs by 2035, with similar requirements for sales of new, including transit buses, by 2040. Collectively, both Executive Orders from the Governor's Climate Action Plan for Transportation Infrastructure (CAPTI), which the California State Transportation Agency adopted in July of 2021 to direct state investments for multi-modal purposes. The California Air Resources Board (CARB) 2022 Scoping Plan for Achieving Carbon Neutrality² sets ambitious targets for ZEV adoption, marking a pivotal shift towards environmentally friendly vehicles to meet California's greenhouse gas reduction goals.

Impact on Transportation Funding: State transportation funding primarily relies on fuel taxes and vehicle fees. Fuel taxes are excise and sales taxes on gasoline and diesel. Vehicle fees include registration and license fees. With advancements in technology leading to more ZEVs

and fuel-efficient cars and trucks, the use of gas and diesel is decreasing. This change is causing a significant drop in the revenue from fuel taxes, creating a funding challenge for transportation projects as traditional revenue sources shrink. This shift necessitates reevaluating how California funds transportation infrastructure to keep up with changing vehicle use and environmental goals.

Key Considerations for Weighing Various Options to Address Transportation Gaps

- Ensure that the funding option adheres to the "user-pays" principle. The "user-pays" principle is a funding concept where individuals who utilize services or infrastructure, such as roads, contribute financially to their maintenance and development. This model ensures that the costs are directly linked to usage, promoting a fair distribution of financial responsibility among users.
- Assess the impact of funding changes on different demographic groups.
- Consider the ease of implementation and the long-term sustainability of new funding sources.

Options for Addressing Transportation Funding Gaps

- Increase Existing Fuel Taxes and Vehicle Fees:
 - **Raise Existing Fuel Taxes:** This aligns with the user-pays principle but may not be sustainable as ZEV adoption increases and fuel efficiency improves. It also poses equity concerns as it more impacts lower-income households.
 - Raise Existing Vehicle Registration Fees (VRF): This is easier to implement since SB 1 mandated the collection of a predictable, stable, and equitable tiered vehicle registration fee that is not directly tied to road usage. The VRF generates \$1.7 billion annually and funds many state competitive programs.
- Shift Transportation Costs to Other Fund Sources:
 - Use General Fund or Existing Special Funds: Shifting costs to the General Fund or special funds deviates from the user-pays principle and could reduce funding for other programs, setting the stage for future political fights. It would be a significant shift from historical funding sources but could provide stable funding for transportation.

- Reduce and Reprioritize Spending on Transportation Programs:
 - Align spending with available revenues: Avoids tax increases or fund redirection. This could negatively impact the transportation system, as climate change impacts increase maintenance needs and as the state pursues goals of reducing VMT by implementing alternative modes.
- Adopt New Transportation-Related Charges:
 - Implement a Road User Charge: Directly tied to road usage, aligning with the user-pays principle. A road user charge, also known as a pay-by-the-mile user fee, mileage fee, or vehicle miles traveled fee, poses equity challenges and higher administrative costs but could offer a sustainable revenue source as the state transitions to ZEVs and more fuel-efficient vehicles. It requires addressing privacy concerns, equity concerns, and finding efficient collection methods.
 - Tax hydrogen and electricity for vehicles: This initiative mirrors the gas tax, aligning with the principle that users pay according to their road usage. Taxation on charging ZEVs at home is tricky and requires special equipment, which could be costly. There is potential inequity if taxation only occurs at public charging stations, benefiting those who can charge their cars at home. This possible new source of money as more people switch to ZEVs does not solve the problem of lost income from hybrid vehicles that use less gas.

Conclusion and Recommendations:

A comprehensive strategy that harmonizes financial stability with environmental objectives is essential to effectively address transportation funding gaps. The goal should be to craft and implement a well-rounded plan that transitions to a sustainable transportation funding model aligned with California's ambitious climate targets.

On Saturday, March 9th, President Biden signed into law the FY 2024 minibus spending package, which includes the following appropriations bills: (1) **Transportation-Housing and Urban Development (THUD)**; (2) Agriculture-Food & Drug Administration (Ag), (3) Energy and Water; (4) Commerce, Justice, Science; (5) Interior and Environment; and (6) Military Construction-Veterans Affairs, and (4). The THUD bill includes \$1.811 million for the G12 Pajaro to Prunedale project, which was requested by Senator Padilla last year. Funding for the project will be administered through Caltrans.

While Congress continues to work on passing the other six appropriations bills, members of Congress and Senators have begun accepting FY 2025 community project funding requests. Senator Butler's appropriations portal opened on February 26 and closes on March 12. TAMC approved two project submissions to Senator Butler, the Elkhorn Slough Climate Resiliency project and the King City Multimodal Transportation Center. Both are compelling projects and will hopefully grab the attention of the congressional delegation. Mayor Dave Potter will have the opportunity to discuss these projects with Representatives Lofgren and Panetta, as well as Senator Padilla's staff, the week of March 11.

We expect Senator Padilla's, Representative Lofgren's and Representative Panetta's appropriations forms to be available soon and will continue working with you to submit your projects during this process.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Safe Routes to School Education & Encouragement Consultant - Request for Proposals:

- APPROVE the scope of work for a Request for Proposals for professional services to deliver Safe Routes to School education and encouragement programming across Monterey County, subject to agency counsel approval;
- 2. **AUTHORIZE** staff to publish the Request of Proposals and return to the Board with a recommendation for approval of a consultant, including the final scope of work; and
- 3. **APPROVE** the use of Active Transportation Program grant funding and regional Measure X funds allocated to the Safe Routes to Schools Program, for a total amount not to exceed \$3,622,091.

SUMMARY:

The Monterey County Safe Routes to School Program is looking for a partner to deliver education and encouragement programming across the county. Programming includes traffic safety education for youth and families, walking school buses, family-oriented engagement, volunteer training and community events.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The six-year contract will be funded with \$1,166,114 Active Transportation Program Cycle 5 & 6 funds and \$2,455,977 Measure X Safe Routes to School funding for a total of \$3,622,091 included in the Agency's draft 2024-25 budget.

DISCUSSION:

In February 2018, the TAMC Board adopted the Measure X Safe Routes to School Guidelines, which set goals for safe routes to school in Monterey County. The Measure X Safe Routes to School program is aimed at developing safe, healthy and affordable transportation options for children, educating children and the community how to safely walk, bicycle and carpool, and encouraging children to use active transportation that will lead to a healthier lifestyle. TAMC engaged the consultant firm Ecology Action in 2018 to perform these services; that contract is set to expire on June 30, 2024.

This request for proposal will work toward the following goals identified in the Measure X Safe Routes to School Program Guidelines:

- Education Goal 1: All Children in Monterey County receive pedestrian and bicycle safety education by 5th grade
- Education Goal 2: Parents, guardians, teachers, school staff and surrounding neighborhood community are educated on safe driving, bicycling and walking in support of safe routes to school efforts
- Encouragement Goal 1: The majority of children arrive to school by bus, carpool, bike, scooter/skateboard or walking
- Encouragement Goal 2: All K-12 schools have safe routes to school encouragement programs
- Encouragement Goal 3: All K-12 schools participate in Monterey County Bike Walk Challenge
- Enforcement Goal 1: Crossing guards at all elementary schools
- Enforcement Goal 2: Community-enhanced enforcement
- Equity Goal 1: Countywide Safe Routes to School Program resources are distributed equitably

This request for proposals will be used by TAMC to select a consultant or consultant team to provide safe routes to school education and encouragement programming in communities across Monterey County. To meet the comprehensive Measure X Safe Routes to School Program goals, the scope of work for this contract will include:

- Coordination with schools;
- In-class traffic safety presentations lead by certified instructors;
- Bike rodeos and all necessary equipment;
- Pedestrian education and rodeos for 2nd grade students;
- Participate in Bike & Walk to School and community events;
- Walking school buses;
- Traffic garden curriculum and trainings;
- Crossing guard trainings;
- Outreach and training for school staff, parents and community volunteers;
- Design and develop program pages and content for the Safe Routes to School website;
- Develop and distribute safe routes to school kits;
- Develop bilingual outreach materials for schools, students, and community support;
- Bilingual staffing; and
- Quarterly invoices and progress reports

The consultant scope of work will help to deliver the following Active Transportation Program grants and develop infrastructure to enable the expansion of Measure X Safe Routes to School programs to schools and communities not served through the grant:

- Broadway Complete Streets in the City of Seaside
- Alisal Safe Routes to Schools in the City of Salinas

- Fort Ord Regional Trail and Greenway (FORTAG) project, California Avenue segment in the City of Marina

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) Fair Share Allocation:

- 1. **APPROVE** the request by the City of Soledad to program RSTP fair share funds for the Metz Road Traffic Calming Project in the amount of \$141,229; and
- 2. **APPROVE** amending Exhibit A of the local funding agreement to include these projects and funding.

SUMMARY:

The Agency has distributed Regional Surface Transportation Program fair share funding by a formula of population and lane miles to the local jurisdictions for a wide range of eligible transportation projects. Funding is available at the discretion of the local jurisdiction for their chosen projects, upon approval by the Transportation Agency Board.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The Regional Surface Transportation Program was established by the State of California to utilize gas tax revenues on a wide variety of local transportation projects. The Transportation Agency receives these funds, which total approximately \$6 million per year, and distributes them to the Cities and County in two methods: fair share and competitive share. The Transportation Agency distributes \$1.2 million per year as the fair share component to the cities and County based on population and lane miles. The City of Soledad has a sufficient balance in its fair share reserve to program a total of \$141,229 to this project.

DISCUSSION:

The Transportation Agency is tasked with reviewing projects proposed for Regional Surface Transportation Program fair share monies and approving the funding if the project is deemed eligible under state law. Examples of the types of transportation projects that are eligible for funding include: local street and roadway rehabilitation, bicycle facilities, pedestrian facilities, public transit capital, signal coordination, and other safety and operational improvements.

The City of Soledad is requesting that the Transportation Agency program \$141,229 of fair share Regional Surface Transportation Program funds to the Metz Road Traffic Calming Project. See attached letter for more details. The Metz Road Traffic Calming project in Soledad modified three blocks of Metz Road (State Route 146) between Andalucia Drive and Third Street with new asphalt,

curb, gutter, sidewalk, and median features intended to reduce the speeds of motor vehicles in the vicinity of the project and improve safety for students crossing Metz Road to Gabilan Elementary School and San Vicente Elementary School. The project's location is significant for safe routes to school pedestrian access with two elementary schools, a park, and little league baseball fields immediately adjacent to the project; and the Soledad Community Center and South County YMCA facility nearby.

The City has a remaining balance of \$141,229 of fair share funding available to program to this project, and staff has confirmed this amount with the City. Staff confirms that this project is eligible for this funding and recommends that the Board approve this request.

4. SANTA CRUZ COUNTY ZERO EMISSION RAIL AND TRAIL PROJECT UPDATE

The Committee received an update on the Santa Cruz County Zero Emission Passenger Rail and Trail Project.

Alissa Guther, Transportation Planner, introduced Riley Gerbrandt, Santa Cruz County Regional Transportation Commission (SCCRTC) staff. He noted that the Santa Cruz Branch Line is a continuous transportation corridor that spans approximately 32 miles of Santa Cruz County from the community of Pajaro in northern Monterey County up to Davenport. He noted that the Zero Emission Passenger Rail and Trail Project Purpose and Need statement was developed using information derived from the 2021 Alternatives Analysis/Network Integration Study. Mr. Gerbrandt noted that the project's fundamental purpose is to support and improve equitable multimodal transportation options in Santa Cruz County.

Committee members provided the following feedback on the project update:

- Consider park and ride lots to provide access to drivers.
- Consider contactless payments.
- Calculate health benefits, new job creation.

5. ELKHORN SLOUGH RESILIENCY PROJECT UPDATE

The Committee received an update on the Elkhorn Slough Highway 1 transportation corridor climate resiliency project.

Alissa Guther, Transportation Planner, reported that the Transportation Agency received \$1,000,000 to initiate planning work on the Elkhorn Slough Highway 1 transportation corridor climate resiliency project. She noted that staff met with representatives from the California Department of Fish and Wildlife and Elkhorn Slough National Estuarine Research Reserve at the Elkhorn Slough Reserve to observe the overtopping of the Union Pacific Railroad rail tracks in January 2024. Ms. Guther noted that at king tide, there is a significant difference in water surface elevation between the west and east sides of the tracks. Ms. Guther noted that the rail line will be included in the future planning work that TAMC is pursuing for the Elkhorn Slough Highway 1 transportation corridor, which will evaluate and prioritize alternatives for the rail line.

Committee members provided the following feedback on the project update:

- Consider inviting Union Pacific to participate early in the project discussions.
- Consider gathering more data on potential delays to freight and passenger train trips caused by king tides, sea level rise, and storm surge.

6. PAJARO MULTIMODAL STATION PROJECT UPDATE

The Committee received an update on Pajaro Multimodal Station Project.

Alissa Guther, Transportation Planner, reported that the proposed Pajaro/Watsonville station will be the connection point for Santa Cruz to new passenger rail service on the Coast mainline tracks between Salinas and the San Francisco Bay Area, as well as a hub on future round-the- bay service. She noted that in December 2023, TAMC released a Request for Proposals that received no submissions. Staff re-released the Request for Proposals after more outreach to potential consultants. Ms. Guther noted that proposals are due to TAMC April 4, 2024, and staff anticipates bringing a contract to the TAMC Board for approval on May 22, 2024, for project activities to begin in June 2024.

Chair LeBarre noted that the Committee had an informal meeting with the Santa Cruz County Regional Transportation Commission in October and talked about having another meeting in approximately six months. Alissa Guther noted that TAMC staff would coordinate with SCCRTC staff to set up another meeting after the Board approves the consultant contract and after consultant activites have begun.

7. COAST CORRIDOR RAIL PROJECT UPDATE

The Committee received an update on the planned increase in passenger rail service along the coast corridor between San Francisco and Los Angeles.

Executive Director Todd Muck and Alissa Guther, Transportation Planner, reported that the Coast Rail Coordinating Council met on February 16 in Oakland and discussed Senate Bill 125 funding being secure, Transit and Intercity Rail Capital program application, Federal Rail Administration Corridor Identification Program, Intercity Rail Passenger Rail coordination efforts, and a potential Rail Summit in San Diego in fall 2024.

Committee Member Potter noted that it was good to have state representatives at the meeting.

Committee Member LeBarre noted that the Committee received a briefing on the federal Corridor ID programs from Chad Edison and Shannon Simonds. He mentioned that California is so far ahead of other states and that they are anticipating completing the Service Development Plans within months.

8. RAIL POLICY COMMITTEE ELECTIONS

The Committee held elections for Chair and Vice Chair for 2024-25.

Christina Watson, Director of Planning, noted that bylaws call for the Rail Policy Committee to elect a Chair and Vice Chair in February of every even year.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

FORTAG Canyon Del Rey - Construction Contract:

- 1. **APPROVE** the project plans, Notice to Bidders and Special Provisions;
- 2. APPROVE and AUTHORIZE the Executive Director to execute a contract with Granite Rock Company in an amount not to exceed \$17,994,608, with an anticipated completion date of May 2026, for construction of the Canyon Del Rey segment of the Fort Ord Regional Trail and Greenway (FORTAG) project, subject to (1) approval by Agency Counsel, the Independent Office of Audits and Investigations, and the Office of Civil Rights; and (2) the clearance of any protests related to the bid;
- 3. **APPROVE** the use of State and Measure X funds budgeted for this project in an amount not to exceed \$17,994,608, and \$2,700,000 in contingency funds for unforeseen circumstances; and
- 4. **AUTHORIZE** the Executive Director to take such other further actions as may be necessary to fulfill the intent of the contract, including approvals of future modifications or amendments that do not significantly alter the scope of work, or change the approved contract amount or term.

SUMMARY:

On December 15, 2023, the Agency published bid documents for qualified contractors to construct the Canyon Del Rey segment of the Fort Ord Regional Trail and Greenway (FORTAG) project. The project includes the construction of a 1.8 mile segment of the 28 mile FORTAG paved multi-use recreation trail project. On February 15, 2024, TAMC held a bid opening and received four bids.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

At their June 2023 meeting, the California Transportation Commission awarded TAMC \$9.181 million in State Active Transportation Program funds. This funding allocation requires that TAMC be under contract within 12 months of the allocation (by June 30, 2024). The CTC funding along with \$11.514 million in Regional Measure X funds will allow for the construction of the first segment of the FORTAG multi-use trail.

DISCUSSION:

The vision for the Fort Ord Regional Trail & Greenway (FORTAG) project is to create a multimodal route designated to accommodate people of all ages and abilities that connects communities in and around the former Fort Ord to each other and to education, employment, community and recreation centers. It will serve as a safe pedestrian and bicycle corridor connecting the cities of Seaside, Marina, Del Rey Oaks, Monterey and unincorporated community residents to California State

University Monterey Bay, the Fort Ord National Monument, and the Monterey Bay Sanctuary Scenic Trail.

The Final Environmental Impact Report for the 28-mile paved trail was certified by the Transportation Agency Board on March 25, 2020. A Master Agreement was approved by the Transportation Agency and the underlying jurisdictions by June 2020. Supplemental Agreements specific to this segment of FORTAG were executed with the Cities of Del Rey Oaks and Seaside, and the Monterey Peninsula Regional Parks District in April 2023.

The first segment of the Fort Ord Regional Trail and Greenway (FORTAG) project is known as the Canyon Del Rey segment. It includes construction of the trail through the City of Del Rey Oaks from Fremont Boulevard to Del Rey Woods Elementary School in the City of Seaside. An underpass is proposed under Canyon Del Rey Boulevard between Del Rey Oaks City Hall and the Frog Pond Wetland Preserve. A 12-foot wide raised pathway will be constructed to connect trail users from the underpass to Carlton Drive at an accessible grade. Along Carlton Drive, the trail will consist of a new 12-foot wide multi-use sidewalk with a 5-foot wide buffer on the west side of the road and will continue along the south side of Plumas Avenue to the Del Rey Woods Elementary School.

On December 15, 2023, the Agency advertised for construction bids, with a Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) goal of 22%. The bid opening was held on Thursday, February 15, 2024. The Agency received four bids as follows:

Granite Rock Company	\$ 17,994,607.40
Precision Grade, Inc	\$ 18,572,725.29
Monterey Peninsula Engineering	\$ 19,268,434.09
Granite Construction Company	\$ 20,862,529.00

Granite Rock Company was the apparent low bidder, with a DBE commitment of 10% (meaning that of their total bid, 10% of the contract work would be performed by certified DBE firms). Since Granite Rock Company did not meet the project DBE goal of 22%, Agency staff has submitted documentation to the Caltrans Office of Civil Rights detailing the good faith efforts made by Granite Rock Company to include DBE firms in their bid. Granite Rock provided good faith effort documentation including the following:

- 1. 83 DBE Firms were solicited that are certified to perform Lead Compliance Plan, SWPPP, Clearing and Grubbing, Tree Removal, Landscaping, Erosion Control, Temporary Erosion Control, and Hydroseeding.
- 2. 97 DBE firms were solicited that are certified to perform Construction Area Signs, Traffic Control System, Roadway Signs, Striping, Crash Cushions, Markers, Guardrail, Railings, Concrete Barriers, etc.
- 3. 115 DBE firms were solicited that are certified to perform AC Dike, Slurry Seal, Utility Adjustments, RSP, Minor Concrete, Structural Concrete, CIDH Piles, Rebar, etc.
- 4. 184 DBE firms were solicited that are certified to perform work associated with the retaining wall, precast concrete, site furnishings, etc.
- 5. 180 DBE firms were solicited that are certified to perform Trucking and Street Sweeping.

The Office of Civil Rights is reviewing the submitted information and will make a determination if the contractor demonstrated a good faith effort to meet the DBE participation goal. As such, Agency staff is seeking to award the contract to Granite Rock Company contingent on the good faith efforts review by the Office of Civil Rights.

In addition to the review of the DBE commitment, the Agency received a bid protest from the second low bidder, Precision Grade. Based on the Agency's procurement and protest policies, a Protest Review Committee is being formed to review the protest and prepare a recommendation on its validity. The award of the contract to Granite Rock Company would also be contingent upon the clearance of any protests. If the protest is deemed to be valid and sustained, Agency staff would then need to rescind the Notice of Intent to Award to Granite Rock Company and begin negotiations with Precision Grade. The approval of that new contract would then come back to the Board at a future meeting.

Construction is anticipated to take approximately two years to complete, starting in Spring 2024 and ending by Spring 2026. Other parties under separate agreements with the Agency will provide construction management and design support during construction for this segment of FORTAG. Other segments of FORTAG will proceed to design and construction as matching funds are obtained.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

ADOPT goals, policy objectives and performance measures for the 2026 Regional Transportation Plan.

SUMMARY:

Every four years, the Transportation Agency is responsible for developing an updated Regional Transportation Plan, pursuant to state and federal transportation planning requirements. Adoption of the goals, policy objectives and performance measures is a necessary step in the development of the 2026 Regional Transportation Plan. These collaboratively-developed measures will inform transportation decisions and investments for the 20-year vision for Monterey County.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The 2026 Regional Transportation Plan is being prepared in-house by staff in coordination with Agency committees and the Board of Directors. The Plan's environmental document is budgeted by the Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments not to exceed \$325,000, of which TAMC will pay \$75,000, and will cover the tri-county Metropolitan Transportation Plan as well as the individual Monterey, Santa Cruz and San Benito County Regional Transportation Plans. The Plan will include cost estimates for transportation projects in Monterey County through the 2050 horizon year. The 2022 Regional Transportation Plan's financial estimate identified a total of approximately \$6.7 billion in projected funding for transportation projects in Monterey County through the 2045 horizon year of the plan.

DISCUSSION:

The Regional Transportation Plan for Monterey County is a long range (20+ year) plan, updated every four years. The Plan forms the basis for the tri-county Metropolitan Transportation Plan prepared by the Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments (AMBAG) for the Monterey Bay Area pursuant to Federal Highway Administration and Caltrans transportation planning requirements. The Metropolitan Transportation Plan, which also serves as the Sustainable Communities Strategy, will incorporate the financial assumptions and project lists included in the Regional Transportation Plans for Monterey, Santa Cruz and San Benito Counties.

Pursuant to state and federal guidelines, the Regional Transportation Plan includes a countywide multi-modal needs assessment, transportation policy element, long-range funding forecast, funding-constrained project list, and a program-level environmental review document assessing the probable environmental impacts associated with implementation of the Plan. Public participation is sought after in the development of the Regional Transportation Plan for each of the project steps, and as adopted

by AMBAG through the Monterey Bay Area Public Participation Plan.

Staff initiated the development of updated goals and policy objectives for the 2026 Regional Transportation Plan through an interactive survey shared with the Board of Directors at the October 2023 meeting, and a public-facing version that received 3,035 individual responses and 81 comments during the month it was available. Results of the survey were used to update and refine the goals, policy objectives and performance measures to be more reflective of the feedback received.

Staff recommends aligning the 2026 RTP with the following overarching goals:

- Access & Mobility: Deliver a reliable and accessible transportation system that promotes viable transportation alternatives for all users.
- **Safety & Health**: Create a safe transportation system that fosters county-wide health and wellbeing through promoting active lifestyles.
- **Climate Resilience**: Protect and enhance the County's built and natural environment and promote energy conservation.
- **Equity**: Promote social and geographic equity and improve quality of life through transportation planning, engineering and design.
- **Economic Vitality**: Foster an economically viable, efficient and sustainable transportation system that supports the regional economy.

The proposed goals, policy objectives and performance measures for the Plan are in **Attachment** 1 to this report. Staff coordinated with AMBAG on performance measures to promote cohesion between the agencies.

A cumulative summary of the survey results is included as **a web attachment** to this report.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

PROVIDE direction on Transportation Agency membership in chambers of commerce.

SUMMARY:

The Transportation Agency is a member of the Monterey Peninsula Chamber of Commerce and the Salinas Valley Chamber of Commerce. Both are business organizations which support Transportation Agency projects and programs. Within each chamber is a Government Affairs Committee, which issues candidate endorsements exclusive of direct financial support. In order to address concerns presented to staff about the endorsements, this report seeks guidance on continued membership in the chambers of commerce and other organizations that issue endorsements.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The Transportation Agency spends an average of \$800 per year on memberships with the Monterey Peninsula Chamber of Commerce and the Salinas Valley Chamber of Commerce.

DISCUSSION:

The Transportation Agency has been a member of the Monterey Peninsula Chamber for 28 years, and a member of the Salinas Valley Chamber for 23 years. The Agency is one of hundreds of members comprised of a broad spectrum of business, non-profit, educational, special districts, and public agencies, which include the Cities of Del Rey Oaks, Monterey, Sand City, and Seaside, the County of Monterey Economic Development Department, and the Monterey County Sheriff's Department.

Both chambers support the agency's mission, projects, and programs; and Agency staff find the memberships to be of value. Being a member allows staff to participate in their Government Affairs Committee meetings and be at the forefront of their discussions, sharing information and regular updates on Agency projects and programs. This ongoing opportunity, at an average combined membership cost of \$800 per year, maintains relationships, dispels misinformation, and establishes the agency as a valued member of the community.

Each year, the Government Affairs Committees identify their top priorities and issues of importance. Consistently, each has identified transportation improvements as one of their top issues, which includes monitoring and evaluating the status of Transportation Agency projects, including the following:

• Monterey County Rail Extension project;

- State Route 68 Scenic Highway improvement plan
- State Route 156 widening project;
- SURF! Busway and Bus Rapid Transit project;
- US 101 South of Salinas project;
- Imjin Parkway Roundabout & Widening project; and
- Measure X Citizens Oversight Committee activities.

The Government Affairs Committees' missions include a priority to assess and recommend action and advocacy on local, state, and federal government issues. Accomplishing that mission includes endorsements of candidates and issues, exclusive of direct financial support. Over the decades-long course of the Transportation Agency membership in these chambers, Agency staff has never participated or voted in the endorsement process.

In order to address concerns presented to staff about candidates and issue endorsements, this report seeks guidance from the Transportation Agency Board of Directors on continued membership of the Monterey Peninsula Chamber of Commerce and the Salinas Valley Chamber of Commerce or any other organization which issues endorsements.
