The list of checks and copies of credit card statements are submitted to the Transportation Agency Board each month in accordance with the recommendation from the Transportation Agency's independent Certified Public Accountant to keep the Board informed about the Transportation Agency's financial transactions.

The list of contracts awarded by the Transportation Agency for Monterey County for services under \$50,000 approved by the Executive Director is submitted each month in accordance with the Agency's Procurement Policies to keep the Board informed.

- **3.1.4. APPROVE** Resolution 2023-15, pending legal counsel approval, providing:
 - 1. Authority for the Executive Director or his designee to transfer \$158,883 in carry-over funds from the above-entitled funds and add \$209,789 of new grant funds into the Agency's FY 2023-2024 work program and budget;
 - 2. Authority for the Executive Director or his designee to execute work program and budget amendment No. 1 in accordance with this Resolution; and
 - 3. Authority for the Executive Director or his designee to execute all Restricted Grant Agreements and any amendments thereto with the California Department of Transportation.

This amendment will allow state Rural Planning Assistance and Senate Bill 1 Sustainable Communities grant funds from the prior fiscal year to be utilized in the current fiscal year. New funding received to develop a Regional Transportation Vulnerability Assessment and North Monterey County Safe Routes to School Plan are also included in this amendment.

- 3.1.5. State Legislative Advocate Services Contract:
 - APPROVE and AUTHORIZE the Executive Director to extend the contract with Khouri Consulting for State legislative analyst/ advocate services, subject to approval by Agency Counsel, by two years, until October 31, 2025, adding One Hundred and Forty-Four Thousand Dollars (\$144,000) to the current contract for a total amended contract budget of Two Hundred and Eight-Eight Thousand Dollars (\$288,000);
 - 2. AUTHORIZE the use of reserve funds budgeted to this project; and
 - 3. **AUTHORIZE** the Executive Director to take such other further actions as may be necessary to fulfill the intent of the contract, including approvals of future modifications or amendments that do not significantly alter the scope of work, or change the approved contract term or amount.

The Agency has a contract for State legislative assistance with Khouri Consulting that expires October 31, 2023. The Executive Committee recommends a two-year extension to October 31, 2025 and an additional \$144,000, for a total not-to-exceed contract amount of \$288,000.

3.1.6. Agreement for Accounting Services:

- AUTHORIZE the Executive Director to execute contract Amendment #3 with Oppidea, LLC, in an amount not to exceed \$32,220 per year for an additional twenty-four months to provide accounting services through the period ending December 31, 2025;
- 2. **APPROVE** the use of \$64,440 for the extended term of the Agreement in funds budgeted for this purpose; and
- 3. **AUTHORIZE** the Executive Director to make administrative changes to the contract if such changes do not increase the Agency's net cost, subject to approval by Agency counsel.

The Agency's current agreement expires December 31, 2023. Due to staffing issues and the need for continuity in accounting services, staff recommends a two-year extension of the Agreement. The contract rate of \$32,220 per year was established in January 2023 and is being held constant through the twenty-fourmonth term of this agreement as amended.

3.1.7. APPROVE the appointment of Andromeda Davila to serve as the Youth Representative on the Measure X Citizens Oversight Committee.

The Transportation Safety & Investment Plan Policies calls for the formation of a Citizens Oversight Committee representing a diverse range of community interests. Representatives of these interests must be nominated by their organization. Additional members may be appointed by the Transportation Agency Board of Directors to assure that a broad range of geographic and stakeholder interests are represented on the Committee.

BICYCLE, PEDESTRIAN, TRANSIT, and SOCIAL SERVICES

3.2.1. Federal Transit Grant Section 5310 Application for Monterey-Salinas Transit bus funds:

- 1. **ACCEPT** Monterey-Salinas Transit's Federal transit grant application for twenty-four bus replacements for its RIDES paratransit service and operating assistance for the taxi voucher program; and
- 2. **ADOPT** Resolution No. 2023-12 approving Monterey County's scores for Traditional and Expanded Section 5310 grant applications and certifying that the projects meet federal program requirements and conditions.

The Federal Transit Administration Section 5310 program provides competitive grants for capital and operating costs associated with transportation serving seniors and people with disabilities. Monterey-Salinas Transit submitted an

application for \$2,974,608 in FTA 5310 traditional grant funding to replace buses in their RIDES program and \$755,625 in FTA 5310 expanded grant funding for operating assistance in their Taxi Voucher program. The Transportation Agency is responsible for accepting and scoring the FTA 5310 grant applications within Monterey County, and submitting applications to the state for funding. The Transportation Agency's actions do not approve funding for projects, but assist the FTA/Caltrans in making those decisions.

3.2.2. Monterey-Salinas Transit State of Good Repair Funds

- ADOPT Resolution 2023-13 allocating \$910,697 of Fiscal Year 2023-24
 Senate Bill 1 State of Good Repair funds to Monterey-Salinas Transit to help
 fund non-revenue and revenue vehicle replacements, information technology
 infrastructure upgrades, purchase a scissor lift, and purchase zero emission
 bus charging infrastructure; and
- 2. **AUTHORIZE** the Executive Director or their designee to take any actions and sign and execute on behalf of the Transportation Agency for Monterey County any agreements necessary to pass funds through to Monterey-Salinas Transit.

Senate Bill 1 (SB 1) established the State of Good Repair program to fund eligible transit maintenance, rehabilitation and capital project activities that maintain the public transit system.

The Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments (AMBAG) is required by federal regulations to prepare and maintain a public participation plan for the tricounty region. The 2023 Public Participation Plan is a comprehensive document that guides regional planning agencies and local jurisdictions in the public participation process for the tri-county Monterey Bay region that either receive federal funds or are subject to a federally required action.

3.4.2. APPROVE Resolution 2023-14 adopting Caltrans Local Assistance Procedures Manual Chapter 10: Consultant Selection.

The Transportation Agency is eligible to receive federal and/or state funding for certain transportation projects, through the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans). Title 23 Code of Federal Regulations Part 172 (23 CFR 172) allows Caltrans Division of Local Assistance (DLA) to prescribe the policies and procedures for engineering and design related services, also known as

Architectural and Engineering (A&E). Local Public Agencies are responsible for adopting the written policies and procedures prescribed by Caltrans.

- 3.5.1. Monterey County Rail Extension Temporary Construction Easement Extension:
 - 1. **APPROVE** and **AUTHORIZE** the Executive Director, or their designee, to execute an agreement for purchase / extension of a temporary construction easement with MWM Investments, to extend the term to March 1, 2027 for an amount not to exceed \$26.830:

- Approved and authorized the Executive Director to execute a contract with MNS, subject to approval by Agency Counsel and Independent Office of Audits and Investigations, in an amount not to exceed \$2,692,012, which includes a 15% contingency, to provide construction management services for the Canyon Del Rey segment of the Fort Ord Regional Trail and Greenway (FORTAG) project, for the period ending December 31, 2026;
- 2. Approved the use of Measure X funds budgeted for this project;
- 3. Authorized the Executive Director to take such other further actions as may be necessary to fulfill the intent of the contract, including approvals of future modifications or amendments that do not significantly alter the scope of work, or change the approved contract amount or term; and
- 4. Authorized the Executive Director to take such other further actions as may be necessary to fulfill the intent of the FORTAG Master Agreement, including approvals of future modifications or amendments that do not significantly alter the scope of work, or change the approved purpose of the agreement.

Board Member Donaldson pulled this item for discussion. He expressed concerns with the location of outreach meetings being held in Seaside and requested that they be held in Del Rey Oaks. He also had questions about the bid process and the outreach plan, noting that he wants to be a part of this timeline. Ms. Williamson noted that she would include him in the stakeholder group.

- **3.4.2** Regarding On-Call Property Cleanup Services Smith & Enright Contract Amendment 1:

4. MEASURE X REVENUES

The Transportation Agency Board of Directors received a presentation on the Measure X revenues and the annual adjustment to the Regional Projects and Programs.

Mike Zeller, Director of Programming & Project Delivery, presented that prior to Monterey County voters adopting Measure X in November 2016, revenues were conservatively estimated to be \$20 million per year. Actual revenues have been significantly higher, with the fiscal year 2021/22 revenues totaling \$38.13 million.

The Measure X program's existing fund balance, along with new revenues, will allow the Measure X program of projects to meet programmed local match requirements for the next five years. Since 60% of the Measure X funds are allocated to the cities and County, these increased revenues already filter through for local road and street projects.

Priority regional projects that are expected to start construction during the five-year timeframe include the following projects:

- Imjin Road Widening project, which uses \$18 million in Measure X funds as match to a \$19 million Senate Bill 1 Local Partnership Program grant;
- Highway 218 Segment of the Fort Ord Regional Trail and Greenway project, which used \$1 million in Measure X as a match to a \$10 million Active Transportation Program grant;
- State Route 156/Castroville Boulevard project, which received a \$20 million Senate Bill 1 Trade Corridors grant that is matched with \$10 million in Measure X and \$5 million in development impact fees; and
- SURF! Rapid Bus Corridor, which used \$15 million in Measure X funds as a match to \$1.4 million Senate Bill 1 Local Partnership Program funds, \$24.7 million Federal grants, and a \$25 million Transit and Intercity Rail capital Program grant.

During a review of the Policies and Projects Description for the Transportation Safety and Investment Plan (Measure X), staff identified an approved policy for addressing inflation and increased projects costs that had not previously been implemented. Since Measure X revenues have been consistently higher than expected, and project costs have risen dramatically in recent years, Agency staff proposed to enact the annual inflation adjustment going forward for regional programs and projects using the same construction cost index from the Engineering News Record that is used to index the Measure X Maintenance of Effort requirement.

Board Member Oglesby asked when will the Board be able to add new projects to the list. Director Muck noted that there is no exact date, but noted that once the current projects on the list are completely constructed, we will know what capacity we have for new projects. Board Member

Church commented that inflation needs to be accounted in the baseline amount to show the actual increase in revenues.

5. REPORTS FROM TRANSPORTATION PROVIDERS

Caltrans District 5 – Brandy Rider highlighted Caltrans District 5 construction, road closures and repairs:

- Caltrans thanked the City of Salinas for their Clean California Mural Project on East Market and Alisal Street.
- Caltrans has a comprehensive Storm Water Program for preventing water pollution on properties it manages for a Cleaner Coast Line.
- Caltrans encourages trash collection.

Board Member Sandoval thanked Caltrans for the historic art in the Salinas Community.

Monterey Regional Airport District – No Report.

Monterey Salinas Transit District – Carl Sedoryk announced the following:

- In September 1973, Monterey Peninsula Transit started service with six well-worn buses on four routes serving Monterey, Pacific Grove, Carmel-by-the-Sea, and Seaside.
- The Trolley service will be suspended on Labor Day.
- On October 30, MST will have a Ribbon Cutting for the beginning of service on Line 59, servicing Salinas to Gilroy Transit, providing four trips per day.

Monterey Bay Air Resources District – No Report.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

APPROVE Resolution 2023-15, pending legal counsel approval, providing:

- Authority for the Executive Director or his designee to transfer \$158,883 in carry-over funds from the above-entitled funds and add \$209,789 of new grant funds into the Agency's FY 2023-2024 work program and budget;
- 2. Authority for the Executive Director or his designee to execute work program and budget amendment No. 1 in accordance with this Resolution; and
- 3. Authority for the Executive Director or his designee to execute all Restricted Grant Agreements and any amendments thereto with the California Department of Transportation.

SUMMARY:

This amendment will allow state Rural Planning Assistance and Senate Bill 1 Sustainable Communities grant funds from the prior fiscal year to be utilized in the current fiscal year. New funding received to develop a Regional Transportation Vulnerability Assessment and North Monterey County Safe Routes to School Plan are also included in this amendment.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Amendment No. 1 adds \$64,807 of Rural Planning Assistance funds and \$94,076 of SB 1 Sustainable Communities grant funds carried over from the prior fiscal year.

This amendment also adds a \$378,023 Climate Adaptation Planning Grant awarded to the Transportation Agency for the Monterey County Regional Transportation Vulnerability Assessment. \$48,977 of the Rural Planning Assistance carry-over funds mentioned above have been allocated to match these State funds for a total project cost of \$427,000. Overall Work Program Amendment No. 1 adds \$76,771 of State grant funds to the fiscal year 2023/24 budget to initiate work on the plan. The remainder of the grant will be programmed in FY 2024/25 and FY 2025/26.

Finally, this amendment adds a \$665,091 Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant awarded to the Transportation Agency for the North Monterey County Safe Routes to Schools plan. \$126,684 of Measure X funds have been allocated to match these State funds for a total project cost of \$791,775. Overall Work Program Amendment No. 1 adds \$131,018 of State grant funds to the fiscal year 2023/24 budget to initiate work on the plan. The remainder of the grant will be programmed in FY 2024/25 and FY 2025/26.

DISCUSSION:

The annual Transportation Agency Overall Work Program describes the activities to be accomplished during the fiscal year beginning July 1 and ending June 30. Adopting an annual work program is mandatory to utilize Rural Planning Assistance funds and discretionary planning grants that the Transportation Agency receives from Caltrans. Carry-over amounts and new funding need to be amended into the Overall Work Program and Budget before associated tasks can be initiated.

The Transportation Agency receives an annual allocation of Rural Planning Assistance funds and has the flexibility to program these funds to eligible activities as it deems appropriate. Carry-over funds from the prior fiscal year can likewise be allocated as needed and approved by Caltrans. Rural Planning Assistance carry-over funds totaling \$64,807 is available to be programmed into fiscal year 2023/24.

Staff recommends the carry-over Rural Planning Assistance funds be used to pay for staff activities in the following work elements:

- 6220 Regional Transportation Plan: The Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) for Monterey County is a long range (20+ year) plan, updated every four years, that forms the basis for the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) prepared by Association for Monterey Bay Area Governments for the Monterey Bay Area. The Agency coordinates its update with Association for Monterey Bay Area Governments, the other Monterey Bay regional transportation planning agencies, and partner agencies including California Department of Transportation, Monterey-Salinas Transit, the Monterey Bay Unified Air Pollution Control District and the Monterey Regional Airport District to ensure consistency between plans. Examples of work expected under this work element includes developing the 2026 Regional Transportation Plan.
- 6731 Monterey County Regional Transportation Vulnerability Assessment: The Transportation Agency recently received \$378,023 from the Caltrans Climate Adaptation Grant Program for this project. The funds will be used to assess transportation corridors in Monterey County with a focus on identifying transportation infrastructure in the coastal areas of the county that are at risk of sea level rise, coastal flooding, and erosion, create a project prioritization list, with information on adaptation strategies for the projects on that list. The Rural Planning Assistance funds will be used as a match to a State planning grant that was awarded to the project. Work Element 6731 is being added to the Overall Work Program incorporating this new work effort. Funding for the plan is spread over a three fiscal-year period starting in FY 2023/24 and concluding in FY 2025/26.

The Transportation Agency also recently received \$665,091 from the Caltrans Sustainable Transportation Planning grant program. The funds will be used to develop the North Monterey County Safe Routes to School Plan. The plan will gather data, conduct walking audits and surveys and utilize community input to identify a set of safe routes to school, complete streets, travel demand management and active transportation improvements for eleven K-12 public schools in the unincorporated communities of Castroville, Pajaro, Las Lomas, Prunedale, Royal Oaks, Oak Hills, Aromas, Moss Landing and Elkhorn. The Plan will create a Safe Routes to School Steering Committee to pilot a participatory budgeting process and empower community members to prioritize quick-build projects for implementation following plan adoption. Work Element 6732 is being added to the Overall Work Program incorporating this new work effort. Funding for the plan is spread over a three fiscal-year period starting in FY 2023/24 and concluding in FY 2025/26.

In addition, the Agency received a State grant for the Salinas Valley Safe Routes to School plan in fiscal year 2021/22. Less funds were utilized last year than was anticipated when the Overall Work Program was adopted in May 2022. Correspondingly, an additional \$94,076 of State grant funds are being carried over to the current fiscal year in Work Element 6730.

The Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) for Monterey County is a long range (20+ year) plan, updated every four years, that forms the basis for the Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) prepared by Association for Monterey Bay Area Governments for the Monterey Bay Area pursuant to Federal Highway Administration and Caltrans transportation planning requirements. As the Metropolitan Planning Organization for the Monterey Bay Area, which includes Monterey, San Benito and Santa Cruz counties, the Association for Monterey Bay Area Governments incorporates the financial assumptions and project lists included in the Regional Transportation Plans prepared for Monterey, Santa Cruz and San Benito Counties into the Metropolitan Transportation Plan. The Agency coordinates its update with Association for Monterey Bay Area Governments, the other Monterey Bay regional transportation planning agencies, and partner agencies including California Department of Transportation, Monterey-Salinas Transit, the Monterey Bay Unified Air Pollution Control District and the Monterey Regional Airport District to ensure consistency between plans. Pursuant to state and federal guidelines, the Regional Transportation Plan includes a countywide multi-modal needs assessment, transportation policy element, long-range funding forecast, funding-constrained countywide transportation project list, and a program-level environmental review document assessing the probable environmental impacts associated with implementation of the plan. The Agency seeks public participation to develop the Regional Transportation Plan for each of the project steps identified in the Overall Work Program, and undertakes public outreach for the project according to adopted Monterey Bay Area Public Participation Plan.

Previous and Ongoing Work

Regional (countywide) Transportation Plans have been prepared by the Agency since 1975. These plans and plan elements are to be in place at the time the biennial State Transportation Improvement Program candidate projects are transmitted to the California Transportation Commission via each area's Regional Transportation Improvement Program. Association for Monterey Bay Area Governments has prepared a Metropolitan Transportation Plan for the Santa Cruz, San Benito and Monterey County region since 1991. Since 2002, the regional agencies and Association for Monterey Bay Area Governments have coordinated to prepare a single environmental document and financial estimates for the region's transportation plans.

The Agency completed the 2022 Regional Transportation Plan in June 2022. During 2023, the Agency will begin the process of developing the 2026 Regional Transportation Plan. The updated Regional Transportation Plan and associated California Environmental Quality Act findings are due for adoption by the Agency's Board of Directors in June 2026.

This work supports the Association for Monterey Bay Area Governments priorities for planning and forecasts and sustainable development strategies for the Metropolitan Transportation Plan, as well as collaborative planning and implementation with regional agencies.

Project Description

This project aims to provide a regional safe routes to school plan for four historically underserved rural cities in the Salinas Valley in Monterey County. The Salinas Valley Safe Routes to School Plan will include all the K-12 public schools in five school districts in the cities of Gonzales, Soledad, Greenfield and King City (22 schools total) serving a total of 15,927 students.

In addition to leading a robust public engagement process that will result in a plan with infrastructure and non-infrastructure recommendations, including piloting a Participatory Budgeting Process. The Participatory Budgeting process will more deeply engage community members by empowering them to define and prioritize quick-build projects to be implemented in their city immediately following the adoption of the Plan. Four on-street 'pop-up' demonstrations (one in each city) will allow community members to physically walk, bike and drive through a proposed street design and let the planning team know if they want the improvements to be made permanent. This proposal will test a new kind of immersive planning process that will enable more immediate project implementation and create the robust and engaged community networks necessary to support future safe routes to school programs and projects. This plan will provide the basis for future investments in infrastructure by the local Measure X Safe Routes to Schools program, the SB 1 local road rehabilitation program, and the infrastructure portion of the Active Transportation Program. Founded on a public partnership, this plan will involve active participation by parents, school administrators, neighbors, City staff and officials, County Public Health, community advocacy groups and students from twenty-two K-12 schools.

OVERALL PROJECT OBJECTIVES:

- Identify greatest barriers for active trips to school (walk, bike, skateboard & scooter).
- Identify improvements that would increase pedestrian and bicyclist safety.
- Identify low cost, community-led solutions to increase school-based active trips.
- Identify barriers to public transit and carpooling to schools.
- Identify low cost and community led non-infrastructure solutions to traffic congestion at schools.
- Produce a plan to guide future infrastructure improvements that reduce school-based traffic congestion and increase safe, active and sustainable transportation to and from school.
- This project will directly support the Sustainability, Mobility, Safety, Health and Social Equity goals of this grant program.

Previous and Ongoing Work

Work on the plan will be initiated in the second quarter of fiscal year 2021/2022. The study's schedule spans three fiscal years. Prior work that has been completed include the kick-off meeting with Caltrans in FY21/22; and the steering committee and participatory budgeting process for Greenfield and Soledad, as well as the Existing Conditions report, in FY22/23. All work products funded by the SB 1 Sustainable Communities Competitive grant must be completed by February 29, 2024 and final invoice must be submitted by April 29, 2024.

Project Description

The Transportation Agency for Monterey County has committed to developing Safe Routes to School Plans for Monterey County's students and families through the passage of Measure X. Drawing on multi-agency partnerships the Agency has established with the Monterey County Health Department and non-profit Ecology Action, the North Monterey County Safe Routes to School Plan will gather data, conduct walking audits and surveys and utilize community input to identify a set of safe routes to school, complete streets, travel demand management and active transportation improvements for eleven K-12 public schools in the unincorporated communities of Castroville, Pajaro, Las Lomas, Prunedale, Royal Oaks, Oak Hills, Aromas, Moss Landing and Elkhorn. The Plan will create a Safe Routes to School Steering Committee to pilot a participatory budgeting process and empower community members to prioritize quick-build projects for implementation following plan adoption. The Plan will build on the Regional Transportation Plan and Active Transportation Plan to support mobility, social equity, safety and greenhouse gas reductions supportive of the region's Sustainable Communities Strategy.

Previous and Ongoing Work

Work on the plan will be initiated in the second quarter of fiscal year 2023/2024. The study's schedule spans three fiscal years. All work products funded by the SB 1 Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant must be completed by June 30, 2026 and final invoice must be submitted by August 31, 2026.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

State Legislative Advocate Services Contract:

- APPROVE and AUTHORIZE the Executive Director to extend the contract with Khouri Consulting for State legislative analyst/ advocate services, subject to approval by Agency Counsel, by two years, until October 31, 2025, adding One Hundred and Forty-Four Thousand Dollars (\$144,000) to the current contract for a total amended contract budget of Two Hundred and Eight-Eight Thousand Dollars (\$288,000);
- 2. AUTHORIZE the use of reserve funds budgeted to this project; and
- 3. **AUTHORIZE** the Executive Director to take such other further actions as may be necessary to fulfill the intent of the contract, including approvals of future modifications or amendments that do not significantly alter the scope of work, or change the approved contract term or amount.

SUMMARY:

The Agency has a contract for State legislative assistance with Khouri Consulting that expires October 31, 2023. The Executive Committee recommends a two-year extension to October 31, 2025 and an additional \$144,000, for a total not-to-exceed contract amount of \$288,000.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The adopted Agency budget sets aside local funds for State and federal legislative assistance. Staff proposes to extend the State legislative assistance contract for two years, for a total not-to-exceed cost of \$288,000. Funding for this type of assistance will come from local revenue sources and not any State or federal funds. Utilizing State legislative assistance may result in the protection or allocation of several millions of dollars in additional transportation funds being devoted to transportation projects in the region.

DISCUSSION:

The Transportation Agency has employed the services of a State legislative analyst/advocate since 1999 to assist with requesting State funds for transportation projects in Monterey County and seeking other State actions. The current contract with Khouri Consulting LLC, procured via a competitive request for qualification process in 2020, expires on October 31, 2023.

At their October 4, 2023 meeting, the Executive Committee discussed this contract and voted to recommend the Board approve extending the current contract for another two years, expiring October 31, 2025. The Committee recommends increasing the payment from \$4,000 per month, which was

the rate for the three-year contract, to \$6,000 per month for the next two years. This new rate reflects the lack of a cost of living increase over that contract's duration and the increase in costs over the period of the contract, including increased office space and insurance costs. It is also an acknowledgement that TAMC has been paying Khouri Consulting less than the market rate for similar customers doing the same kind of work.

Gus Khouri has done an excellent job representing TAMC for the past three years, including proactive and timely efforts on behalf of the Agency on multiple bills, grant applications, and other funding issues. Mr. Khouri exhibits a depth of understanding of transportation issues and of Agency priorities. Mr. Khouri recently brought on Mitch Weiss to help him with his workload. Mitch was recently the Executive Director of the California Transportation Commission (CTC) and has an exceptional knowledge of transportation funding and finance.

RECITALS:

- A. **WHEREAS**, TAMC and Consultant entered into an agreement for professional services on October 28, 2020, hereinafter referred to as "Agreement;" and
- B. WHEREAS, TAMC and Consultant desire to amend the Agreement to extend it by two years to October 31, 2025 and add funds to the contract budget to allow for an increase in payment from the existing contract's Four Thousand (\$4,000) per month (Forty-Eight Thousand, \$48,000 per year) to Six Thousand (\$6,000) per month (Seventy-Two Thousand, \$72,000 per year), starting November 1, 2023;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

1. TERM OF AGREEMENT

Paragraph 2 of the Agreement is amended as follows (changes in strikeout and underline): "The term of this Agreement shall begin upon October 28, 2020, contingent upon approval by the TAMC Board of Directors, and Consultant shall commence work only after a Notice to Proceed has been issued by TAMC's Project Manager specified in Paragraph 28. Unless earlier terminated as provided herein, this Agreement shall remain in force until October 31, 2023 2025. Consultant acknowledges that this Agreement is not binding until it is fully executed and approved by TAMC."

2. PAYMENTS TO CONSULTANT; MAXIMUM LIABILITY

Paragraph 3 of the Agreement is amended as follows (changes in strikeout and underline): "Subject to the limitations set forth herein, TAMC shall pay to Consultant the amounts provided in Exhibit B: Budget, upon receipt and acceptance of deliverables listed therein. Each payment by TAMC shall be for a specific deliverable outlined in Exhibit A: Scope of Work and Schedule. The maximum amount payable to the

Consultant under this Agreement is set forth in Exhibit B: Budget and shall not exceed the amount of One Hundred Forty-Four Thousand Dollars (\$144,000) Two Hundred Eighty-Eight Thousand Dollars (\$288,000). If there is any conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of either Exhibit A (Scope of Work) or Exhibit B (Budget), the terms of this Agreement shall prevail. TAMC does not guarantee any minimum amount of dollars to be spent under this Agreement."

The Budget attached to the Agreement as Exhibit B is hereby replaced with the Budget attached hereto as Exhibit B-1 and shall be effective upon execution.

The Scope of Services is unchanged.

3. **REMAINDER OF TERMS UNCHANGED**

All other terms of the Agreement, as amended, remain in full effect.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Agreement for Accounting Services:

- 1. **AUTHORIZE** the Executive Director to execute contract Amendment #3 with Oppidea, LLC, in an amount not to exceed \$32,220 per year for an additional twenty-four months to provide accounting services through the period ending December 31, 2025;
- 2. **APPROVE** the use of \$64,440 for the extended term of the Agreement in funds budgeted for this purpose; and
- 3. **AUTHORIZE** the Executive Director to make administrative changes to the contract if such changes do not increase the Agency's net cost, subject to approval by Agency counsel.

SUMMARY:

The Agency's current agreement expires December 31, 2023. Due to staffing issues and the need for continuity in accounting services, staff recommends a two-year extension of the Agreement. The contract rate of \$32,220 per year was established in January 2023 and is being held constant through the twenty-four-month term of this agreement as amended.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The consultant currently has a monthly rate of \$2,685 (\$32,220 annually), which will remain unchanged for the term of this Amendment. There are sufficient funds in the budget to cover this expense on an annual basis.

DISCUSSION:

The Agency's current contract for accounting services expires on December 31, 2023; an agreement needs to be in place before the current Agreement expires.

Oppidea, LLC was selected in 2016 after a competitive Request for Proposals was issued. In June 2019, the Board authorized amendment #1 to extend the contract until December 31, 2022. In September 2022, the Board authorized amendment #2 to extend the contract until December 31, 2023. Due to several retirements that have occurred in the accounting department, with one position still unfilled, the need for continuity of the Agency's specialized accounting needs is critical. The contractor has agreed to leave the monthly cost unchanged from the current rate through the new expiration date of December 31, 2025. Therefore, staff recommends the approval of a twenty-four month extension of the current Agreement with Oppidea to provide accounting services to the Transportation Agency for Monterey County, based on experience, knowledge, and cost.

Subject: Measure X Citizens Oversight Committee Appointment

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

APPROVE the appointment of Andromeda Davila to serve as the Youth Representative on the Measure X Citizens Oversight Committee.

SUMMARY:

The Transportation Safety & Investment Plan Policies calls for the formation of a Citizens Oversight Committee representing a diverse range of community interests. Representatives of these interests must be nominated by their organization. Additional members may be appointed by the Transportation Agency Board of Directors to assure that a broad range of geographic and stakeholder interests are represented on the Committee.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Prior to Monterey County voters adopting Measure X in November 2016, revenues were conservatively estimated to be \$600 million over the 30-year life of the Measure. Actual revenues, however, have been significantly higher. To account for rising project costs, the Measure X Policies and Project Descriptions allows for annual inflation adjustments, which currently forecasts the total Measure at \$726 million.

DISCUSSION:

In accordance with the Policies & Project Description for the Transportation Safety & Investment Plan (web attachment), a Citizens Oversight Committee representing a diverse range of community interests was formed within six months of voter approval of Measure X. Members and their alternates were nominated by the organizations they were representing, and appointed by the Transportation Agency Board to serve on the Committee. Additional members were appointed by the Transportation Agency Board of Directors to assure that a broad range of geographic and stakeholder interests are represented on the Committee.

Andromeda Davila has been nominated to serve as the youth representative on the Measure X Citizens Oversight Committee. The nomination was submitted by Seaside City Council Member, Alexis Garcia - Arrazola, who is a former youth representative who served on the committee. Anromeda Davila is a student at California State University Monterey Bay, and currently interns in the office of State Senator John Laird. This report seeks Board approval to appoint Anromeda Davila to serve as the youth representative on the Measure X Citizens Oversight Committee.

Subject: Federal Section 5310 Application for Funding Transit for Seniors and

Persons with Disabilities

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Federal Transit Grant Section 5310 Application for Monterey-Salinas Transit bus funds:

- ACCEPT Monterey-Salinas Transit's Federal transit grant application for twenty-four bus replacements for its RIDES paratransit service and operating assistance for the taxi voucher program; and
- ADOPT Resolution No. 2023-12 approving Monterey County's scores for Traditional and Expanded Section 5310 grant applications and certifying that the projects meet federal program requirements and conditions.

SUMMARY:

The Federal Transit Administration Section 5310 program provides competitive grants for capital and operating costs associated with transportation serving seniors and people with disabilities. Monterey-Salinas Transit submitted an application for \$2,974,608 in FTA 5310 traditional grant funding to replace buses in their RIDES program and \$755,625 in FTA 5310 expanded grant funding for operating assistance in their Taxi Voucher program. The Transportation Agency is responsible for accepting and scoring the FTA 5310 grant applications within Monterey County, and submitting applications to the state for funding. The Transportation Agency's actions do not approve funding for projects, but assist the FTA/Caltrans in making those decisions.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

There is no impact to the Transportation Agency budget associated with this action. A total of \$22.3 million in Section 5310 program funds for Fiscal Year 2023 are available through Caltrans on a competitive basis for small urban and rural areas. This cycle has no funding cap per agency as traditionally seen in previous cycles and no requirement for local matching funds as long as the awarded projects stay within the grant amount. Monterey-Salinas Transit submitted a grant application for \$2,974,608 of Federal Transit Administration 5310 funds with \$385,392 from Measure Q, as MST's local match. The requested action will authorize MST to secure grant funds if awarded by Caltrans.

DISCUSSION:

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5310 grant program provides capital grants to public agencies and certified non-profit organizations for the purpose of meeting the transportation needs of the elderly and persons with disabilities where public transportation services are otherwise

unavailable, insufficient or inappropriate. Eligible projects for these grant funds include purchases of new vehicles and equipment to support paratransit programs.

The Transportation Agency is designated by Caltrans to determine the eligibility of 5310 grant program applicants, review and score 5310 program grant applications submitted for projects in Monterey County, and submit a Regional Priority Project list to Caltrans that identifies scores for each 5310 project. For the 5310 program, each vehicle or piece of equipment provided in an application is considered an individual "project" for scoring purposes and is included in the project priority list.

For the current grant cycle, the Transportation Agency received a 5310 program application from Monterey-Salinas Transit (MST), which relies on the Section 5310 grant program for its RIDES program vehicle replacement needs. MST's application has a total project cost of \$3,360,000, requesting \$2,974,608 of Federal Transit Administration 5310 funds with a local match of \$385,392. The grant will allow MST to purchase twenty-four (24) vehicles to replace aging and high mileage vehicles in the RIDES fleet. The RIDES program provides service pursuant to the Americans with Disabilities Act to individuals unable to use fixed-route public transit due to age or disability. This program is otherwise an unfunded federal mandate.

For the FTA 5310 grant program, each vehicle replacement is assigned an individual score and listed in the Regional Project Priority List. FTA 5310 grant projects are scored according to specific criteria established by Caltrans consistent with federal requirements for this program. The Transportation Agency is only responsible for scoring the Traditional Application and not the expanded application in which MST applied for additional funding for their Taxi Voucher Program. The expanded application will be reviewed by Caltrans and the State Review Committee.

The Regional Priority Project List for the 5310 program, which includes scores calculated by staff for each project, is included with the attached resolution. MST earned scores ranging from 85 to 100 for each of the vehicle replacement projects; in the past, projects that score above 70 have been awarded grant funding. Projects proposing to replace vehicles with lower mileage tend to score lower than replacing high-mileage vehicles. The Transportation Agency reviewed MST's application and submitted scores to Caltrans. Staff requests that the board adopt Resolution 2023-12 (attached), which certifies that MST's project meets federal program requirements and is consistent with the 2022 Regional Transportation Plan, and approves the Regional Priority Project List for the FTA 5310 program.

Once submitted to Caltrans, the applications are reviewed by the State Review Committee, then the Transportation Agency will verify the Regional Prioritized List for submissions to the FTA by Caltrans. The California Transportation Commission (CTC) is scheduled to approve the final project list and award funding in summer 2024.

WHEREAS, the U. S. Department of Transportation is authorized to make grants to states through the Federal Transit Administration (FTA C 9070.1G) to support projects for non-urbanized public transportation systems under Section 5310 of the Federal Transit Act Federal law (Title 49 U.S.C. Section 5310) to provide for grants for the purpose of assisting private nonprofit corporations and public agencies in providing transportation services to meet the needs of elderly persons and persons with disabilities for whom public mass transportation services are otherwise unavailable, insufficient, or inappropriate; and

WHEREAS, the California Department of Transportation (Department) has been designated by the Governor of the State of California to administer Section 5310 Program grants for public transportation projects; and

WHEREAS, the Transportation Agency is charged with scoring local applications for the Section 5310 program for specialized transportation; and

WHEREAS, Monterey-Salinas Transit (MST) has submitted two Section 5310 grant applications to the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) with a total project cost of \$3,360,000 to purchase 24 replacement vehicles to ensure the continued effectiveness of the RIDES program, which offers service for the elderly and persons with disabilities pursuant to the Americans with Disabilities Act, and \$1,511,250 for taxi vouchers from FY 24 through FY 26; and

WHEREAS, MST has, to the maximum extent feasible, coordinated with other transportation providers and users in the region; and

WHEREAS, the Transportation Agency has scored the projects included in the application submitted by MST; and

WHEREAS, the projects being recommended for funding are consistent with the Monterey County Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) and the Monterey Bay Area Coordinated Public Transit Human Services Transportation Plan; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. The Transportation Agency hereby certifies that the projects submitted by Monterey-Salinas Transit for funding in the section 5310 FY22-23 funding cycle provide specialized transportation services to Monterey County meet the requirements and conditions of 49 U.S.C. 5310 and are eligible for the Section 5310 funds; and
- 2. The Transportation Agency certifies that the projects submitted are consistent with the 2022 Regional Transportation Plan and Monterey Bay Area Coordinated Public Transit Human Services Transportation Plan; and
- 3. The Transportation Agency assures that the projects recommended and approved by the California Transportation Commission will be included in the Federal Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Monterey-Salinas Transit State of Good Repair Funds

- ADOPT Resolution 2023-13 allocating \$910,697 of Fiscal Year 2023-24 Senate Bill 1 State of Good Repair funds to Monterey-Salinas Transit to help fund non-revenue and revenue vehicle replacements, information technology infrastructure upgrades, purchase a scissor lift, and purchase zero emission bus charging infrastructure; and
- 2. **AUTHORIZE** the Executive Director or their designee to take any actions and sign and execute on behalf of the Transportation Agency for Monterey County any agreements necessary to pass funds through to Monterey-Salinas Transit.

SUMMARY:

Senate Bill 1 (SB 1) established the State of Good Repair program to fund eligible transit maintenance, rehabilitation and capital project activities that maintain the public transit system.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

This action will allow Monterey-Salinas Transit (MST) to secure \$910,697 in State of Good Repair funds available for Monterey County for Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-24.

DISCUSSION:

Senate Bill 1 is a landmark transportation bill adopted in 2017 that will provide over \$50 million in new transportation funding over the next decade to repair highways, bridges and local roads, to make strategic investments in congested commute and freight corridors, and to improve transit service. The State of Good Repair Program provides approximately \$105 million annually to transit operators in California for capital projects. The Program is funded under a portion of the new Transportation Improvement fee on vehicle registrations due on or after January 1, 2018. The Program investments will benefit the public by providing transportation agencies with a consistent and dependable revenue source to invest in the upgrade, repair, and improvement of transit infrastructure, and in turn, improvement of transit service.

As a transportation planning agency, the Transportation Agency is an eligible recipient of Program funds for Monterey County, and can act as a lead agency on eligible projects or as a "contributing agency" that can pass funds to MST to support an eligible project. Program funds are allocated to regional transportation planning agencies and to transit operators using the State Transit Assistance distribution formula, which allocates funding to transportation planning agencies based on population

(PUC 99313) and to transit operators based on transit operator revenues (PUC 99314). The Transportation Agency's allocation of Program funds is \$694,172 and MST's allocation is \$216,525 for a Monterey County total of \$910,697.

Staff recommends that the Transportation Agency act as a "contributing sponsor" and release its FY 2023-24 State of Good Repair allocation to support Monterey-Salinas Transit's non-revenue and revenue vehicle replacements, IT infrastructure upgrades, purchasing a scissor lift, and purchasing zero emission bus charging infrastructure.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

ADOPT Final 2023 Public Participation Plan.

SUMMARY:

The Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments (AMBAG) is required by federal regulations to prepare and maintain a public participation plan for the tri-county region. The 2023 Public Participation Plan is a comprehensive document that guides regional planning agencies and local jurisdictions in the public participation process for the tri-county Monterey Bay region that either receive federal funds or are subject to a federally required action.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Transportation Agency staff time to participate in updating the Public Participation Plan is funded through state planning funds allocated to the Transportation Agency for transportation planning. These funds are included in the Agency's approved budget.

DISCUSSION:

The federally required 2023 Public Participation Plan is a comprehensive document that guides regional planning agencies and local jurisdictions in the public participation process for the tri-county Monterey Bay region that either receive federal funds or are subject to a federally required action. AMBAG, as the federally designated Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the Monterey Bay region, prepares and adopts the Public Participation Plan at least once every four years.

The 2023 Public Participation Plan covers the four-year period from 2023-2026 and complies with the current transportation authorization act. The 2023 Public Participation Plan emphasizes the transportation decision making process, including the expanded use of visualization techniques and innovative online marketing strategies in public outreach.

Key sections of the 2023 Public Participation Plan are listed below:

- Public Participation Plan Guiding Principles
- 2023 Public Participation Plan Timeline
- Incorporating Limited-English Proficiency (LEP) Populations into the plan
- Public Participation Plan Procedures and Development Process
- Interested Parties and Public Engagement
- Online and Visualization Outreach Strategies

An updated Public Participation Plan is the required guide for all public involvement activities conducted by AMBAG. As such, the plan contains the procedures, strategies and techniques used by AMBAG for public involvement in all programs and projects that use federal funds. A number of appendices are included in the 2023 Plan. For example, Appendix G includes the 2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy (MTP/SCS) Public Involvement Program. This appendix outlines how AMBAG will engage the public and stakeholders throughout the development of the 2050 MTP/SCS.

An overview of the 2023 Public Participation Plan development process was presented to the Transportation Agency's Technical Advisory Committee in spring 2023, followed by a presentation of the Draft Public Participation in May and June 2023. On August 23, 2303, the Transportation Agency's Board of Directors received a presentation on the Draft 2023 Public Participation Plan and conducted a public hearing to hear comments on the plan during it's 70-day public comment review period. This report requests that the Transportation Agency for Monterey County Board of Directors adopt the Final Draft 2023 Public Participation Plan.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

APPROVE Resolution 2023-14 adopting Caltrans Local Assistance Procedures Manual Chapter 10: Consultant Selection.

SUMMARY:

The Transportation Agency is eligible to receive federal and/or state funding for certain transportation projects, through the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans). Title 23 Code of Federal Regulations Part 172 (23 CFR 172) allows Caltrans Division of Local Assistance (DLA) to prescribe the policies and procedures for engineering and design related services, also known as Architectural and Engineering (A&E). Local Public Agencies are responsible for adopting the written policies and procedures prescribed by Caltrans.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

No financial impact, although non-compliance of this adoption may result in loss of funds and/or sanctions.

DISCUSSION:

On August 4, 2021, Caltrans released Office Bulletin #21-05, from the Caltrans Division of Local Assistance. The Office Bulletin cited Chapter 10 of the Local Assistance Procedures Manual (LAPM) and stated that it has been updated to specify how local public agencies need to submit evidence adopting Chapter 10 by their governing body.

The Division of Local Assistance (DLA) policies and procedures for local agency procurement of Architecture & Engineering consultant services presently reside in Chapter 10 of the LAPM. The Division of Local Assistance requires that Local Public Agencies (LPAs) adopt Chapter 10 of the LAPM for federal-funded A&E contracts. To meet this requirement, LPAs are required to provide either a copy of the agency's Board Resolution or an official letter signed by the agency's Public Works Director stating the LPA has adopted Chapter 10 of the LAPM. To avoid having to resubmit this declaration annually, Agency staff are recommending the approval of a Board resolution adopting Chapter 10 of the LAPM.

WHEREAS, the Transportation Agency for Monterey County is responsible for constructing transportation projects that are state and federally funded; and

WHEREAS, in order to comply with the Federal regulations and due to limited staffing and expertise, certain services including Architectural and Engineering (A&E) are contracted out to qualified firms; and

WHEREAS, the Federal regulations set forth standards for procuring and administering A&E contracts; and

WHEREAS, the provisions of the Brooks Act (40 United States Code, Section 1104) requires local agencies to award federally funded engineering and design-related contracts, otherwise known as A&E contracts, on the basis of fair and open competitive negotiations, demonstrated competence, and professional qualifications (23 CFR 31.201-3); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 23 CFR 172.5 (b), local agencies shall develop and sustain organizational capacity and provide the resources necessary for the procurement, management, and administration of engineering and design related consultant services, reimbursed in whole or in part with Federal-Aid Highway Program funding as specified in 23 U.S.C. 106(g)(4)(A); and

WHEREAS, the provision 23 CFR 172.5 (b)(1) requires local agencies to adopt written policies and procedures for the procurement, management, and administration of engineering and design related consultant services in accordance with applicable Federal and State laws and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the State of California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) has developed the Local Assistance Procedures Manual (LAPM), Chapter 10, Consultant Selection which sets forth policies and procedures to be utilized by local agencies in the procurement and management of A&E contracts on state and federal funded transportation projects to ensure compliance with

applicable Federal and State laws and regulations and to maintain eligibility for Federal-Aid reimbursement; and

WHEREAS, the Transportation Agency for Monterey County has developed additional policies, dated April 27, 2016, and further amended April 27, 2022, to ensure avoidance of conflict of interests in the performance of A&E services for state and federal funded transportation projects; and

WHEREAS the Transportation Agency for Monterey County desires to adopt Caltrans's LAPM Chapter 10 and the Agency's conflict of interest policies for compliance with Federal regulations on the procurement and administration of A&E contracts.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Transportation Agency for Monterey County Board of Directors as follows:

Section 1. The above recitals are true and correct findings of the Transportation Agency for Monterey County Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Local Assistance Procedures Manual, Chapter 10, Consultant Selection dated January 2023 or as amended in future updates, is approved, and adopted.

Section 3. The Procurement Policies and Procedures and Contract Management Manual dated April 27, 2022, and the Construction Contract Administration Policies and Procedures Manual, dated May 25, 2016, developed by the Transportation Agency for Monterey County for State and Federal Funded Projects are approved and adopted.

Section 4. Authorizes the Executive Director to approve amendments to the Agency's adopted procurement policies in consultation with the Federal Highways Administration.

Extension

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Monterey County Rail Extension - Temporary Construction Easement Extension:

- APPROVE and AUTHORIZE the Executive Director, or their designee, to execute an agreement for purchase / extension of a temporary construction easement with MWM Investments, to extend the term to March 1, 2027 for an amount not to exceed \$26,830;
- 2. **AUTHORIZE** the use of Traffic Congestion Relief Program #14 funds budgeted to this project; and
- 3. **AUTHORIZE** the Executive Director, or their designee, to take such other further actions as may be necessary to fulfill the intent of the agreement, including approvals of future modifications or amendments that do not significantly alter the scope of work, or change the approved contract term or amount.

SUMMARY:

Agency staff is seeking to extend the temporary construction easement agreed to with MWM Investments for Package 2 (layover facility) of the Monterey County Rail Extension project to match the current construction schedule for the project.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The Salinas Rail Extension Kick Start project budget includes secured funding for property acquisition. The total project budget is estimated at \$81 million.

DISCUSSION:

The Monterey County Rail Extension Project extends passenger rail service from Santa Clara County south to Salinas. TAMC is pursuing a phased implementation of the Project. Phase 1, known as the Kick Start Project, includes Salinas train station circulation improvements, a train layover facility in Salinas, and track improvements at the Gilroy station and between Salinas and Gilroy. The Kick Start Project has completed construction of Package 1, improvements at the Salinas train station. The layover facility (Package 2) and track improvements (Package 3) are now at 100% design by HDR Engineering. The design schedule currently anticipates final plans, specifications & estimates (PS&E) in summer 2024, and circulating bid documents for construction in winter 2024.

At the March 22, 2017 meeting, the Transportation Agency Board of Directors approved resolutions of necessity for nine properties necessary for the Monterey County Rail Extension Project. As part of

this process, the Agency acquired a portion of the property previously owned by MWM Investments located at 21 Happ Place in Salinas, along with a 48-month temporary construction easement. Through a license agreement between the Agency and MWM Investments, the term of the temporary construction easement was set to begin once MWM Investments completed a "cut and cap" of their warehouse to remove a portion of the building that was constructed in the right-of-way needed for the rail extension project. The "cut and cap" was completed in March 2020, meaning the temporary construction easement would run until March 2024, which is before bid documents are expected to be circulated.

The proposed Temporary Construction Easement (TCE) extension would extend the term for the Temporary Construction Easement from March 1, 2024 until March 1, 2027 consistent with the current project schedule. The rate of compensation for the TCE was determined by using the values included in the original 2016 appraisal report and applying the annual rate for an additional three years.

TRANSPORTATION AGENCY FOR MONTEREY COUNTY AGREEMENT FOR PURCHASE/EXTENSION OF TEMPORARY CONSTRUCTION EASEMENTS

This Agreement is based on the following facts:

- A. The Transportation Agency for Monterey County filed an eminent domain action on April 6, 2017, in Monterey Superior Court to acquire fee interests and temporary construction easements in portions of the property located at 21 Happ Place in the City of Salinas and County of Monterey, State of California, Assessor's Parcel Numbers 002-031-030 and 002-171-028, for a public use, more particularly for the construction of the Salinas Rail Extension Kick Start Project.
- B. Judgment in Condemnation after Jury Trial Action in Eminent Domain was entered on July 9, 2019.
- C. The fair market value of the temporary construction easements was determined to be \$35,773.00
- D. The Parties entered into a license agreement that provided that the TCE's commenced on July 1, 2018, except for any portion of the TCE on which the warehouse was located in order to allow reconstruction of same.
- E. The Parties entered into an Amendment to License Agreement which provided that the TCEs "shall commence upon completion of the 'Cut and Cap'".
- F. On September 11, 2019, the Court entered a Final Order of Condemnation that ordered, adjudged and decreed the "Temporary Construction Easements more particularly described and depicted in Exhibits B and B-1 are hereby condemned to and taken by TAMC for the following public use, to wit, for purposes of development and construction of the Salinas Rail Extension Project."
- G. The fair market value was determined by multiplying \$119,243 by a rate of return of 7.5% times for four years. This agreement extends the TCEs by an additional 3 years for additional total compensation due Property Owner of \$26,829.68.

Now, therefore, the Parties agree:

1. Definitions. In this Agreement:

TAMC means the Transportation Agency for Monterey County, and its officers, employees, agents and contractors.

Project means the Salinas Rail Extension Project.

GRANTOR, or *Property Owner*, means MWM Investments, LLC, a California limited liability company.

Property means the parcel(s) owned by GRANTOR on which the temporary construction easements are located

TCE or the TCE Area means the Temporary Construction Easements, described in **Attachment 1** including **Exhibits B** and **B-1**.

APNs: 002-031-030 AND 002-171-028

PROJECT: SALINAS RAIL EXTENSION KICK START PROJECT

2. Title VI Compliance. The parties to this Agreement shall, pursuant to Section 21.7(a) of Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, comply with all elements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. This requirement under Title VI and the Code of Federal Regulations is to complete the USDOT Non-Discrimination Assurance requiring compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 49 C.F.R. Parts 21 and 28 C.F.R. Section 50.3.

Further, no person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity that is the subject of this contract.

3. Grant of TCEs. GRANTOR shall submit to TAMC a *Grant of Temporary Construction Easements Deed* suitable for recordation conveying the TCEs from GRANTOR to TAMC. The form of the Grant of TCEs shall be substantially as set forth in **Attachment 1**, with the attached legal descriptions and plat maps identified as **Exhibits B** and **B-1**.

4. Purchase.

- A. <u>Consideration</u>. TAMC shall pay the sum of TWENTY-SIX THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED and THIRTY Dollars (\$26,830.00) to GRANTOR as consideration for the Temporary Construction Easements.
- B. <u>Escrow and title charges</u>. TAMC agrees to pay all escrow, recording and title insurance charges, if any, incurred in this transaction.
- 5. Temporary Construction Easements.
 - A. <u>Grant of TCE</u>. As noted in Section 3, GRANTOR shall submit to TAMC a *Grant of Temporary Construction Easements Deed* suitable for recordation extending/conveying the TCEs from GRANTOR to TAMC. The form of the Grant of TCEs shall be substantially as set forth in **Attachment 1**, including its **Exhibit B** and **B-1**.
 - B. <u>Permit</u>. The TCE permits TAMC to enter upon GRANTOR'S Property on a temporary basis, not longer than an additional 36-month period from commencement of possession of the TCEs obtained through the eminent domain action referenced above. The new TCE period shall begin March 1, 2024 and terminate March 1, 2027. TAMC will give the GRANTOR: (1) at least 30 days prior written notice before it is about to begin construction; and (2) at least 48 hours advanced written notice before the first entry on the TCE.

This TCE Area shall terminate either upon GRANTOR receiving written notification of the completion of construction of that portion of the project lying adjacent to the above-described parcel, or March 1, 2027, whichever occurs first, unless the term is extended pursuant to AGREEMENT. Within thirty (30) days following expiration of the term of this Grant of Temporary Construction Easements, TAMC shall deliver to GRANTOR a fully-executed Quitclaim Deed in recordable form reasonably acceptable to GRANTOR quitclaiming TAMC's right, title, and interest in the TCE Area and terminating this Grant of Temporary Construction Easements.

C. <u>Permit Extension</u>. In case of unpredictable delays in construction, upon written notification by TAMC, the terms of the Temporary Construction Easements may be extended by an amendment to the Agreement. GRANTOR shall be compensated based on the same calculation as that upon which judgment was rendered following a jury trial. Payment shall be made to the GRANTOR for the extension prior to the expiration of the original period.

D. <u>Restoration</u>. TAMC agrees to promptly restore any damage to the TCE area (including the parcels upon which the TCEs are situated, and any improvements located there caused by TAMC'S entry or work performed in connection with the Project.

- E. <u>Grantor's Conveyance</u>. If the GRANTOR sells, conveys or assigns any property interest, encumbered by this Agreement, GRANTOR shall notify the successor or assignor of the rights and obligations under this Agreement. TAMC has no obligation to compensate a successor or assignee for the rights and interests granted to TAMC under this Agreement.
- **6. TAMC Performed Work.** All work done under this Agreement shall conform to all applicable building, fire and sanitary laws, ordinances, and regulations relating to such work, and shall be done in a good workmanlike manner. All structures, improvements or other facilities, when removed, and relocated, or reconstructed by the TAMC or its authorized agent, shall be left in as good condition as found.
- **7. TAMC's Indemnification.** TAMC shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless GRANTOR from and against all claims, causes of action, damages, liabilities, cost and expenses (including reasonable attorney fees and costs), arising from or related to TAMC'S rights under this Agreement, except as to action, damages, liabilities or costs due to GRANTOR's negligence or willful misconduct.
- **8. Right of Possession and Use.** TAMC's right of possession shall commence on the date the amount of funds as specified in Section 4.A herein are deposited into the escrow controlling this transaction. The consideration shown in Section 4.A includes, but is not limited to, full payment for the possession and use from that date, including interest and damages if any.
- **9. Notice to successors.** If GRANTOR sells, conveys or assigns any property interest encumbered by this Agreement before TAMC exercises its rights, GRANTOR shall notify the successor or assignor of the rights and obligations under this Agreement.
- **10. Escrow Instructions.** GRANTOR authorizes TAMC to prepare and file escrow instructions in accordance with this Agreement on behalf of both parties.
- **11. No Leases.** GRANTOR warrants that there are no oral or written leases on all or any portion of TCE Area. GRANTOR agrees to hold TAMC harmless and reimburse TAMC for any of its losses and expenses occasioned by reason of any lease of the TCE Area held by a tenant.
- 12. Release of All Claims. This is intended as a full and complete release of all or any claims that either party has against the other and is in full settlement of any and all such claims and intends to and does hereby release all of said persons, firms, associations and corporations of and from any and all liability of any nature whatsoever for all claims or causes of action including those for all consequences, effects and results of any loss, injury or damage, whether the same are now known or unknown to the undersigned, expected or unexpected by the undersigned, or have already appeared or developed or may now be latent or may in the future appear or develop. GRANTOR hereby acknowledges that the compensation paid to GRANTOR through this Agreement constitutes the full and complete settlement of any and all claims against TAMC, by reason of TAMC's extension/acquisition of the TCEs, specifically including, but not limited to, any and all rights and claims that GRANTOR has, may have, or may in the future have under Article 1, Section 19 of the California Constitution, the California Eminent Domain Law, Code of Civil Procedure section 1230.010 et seq., or any other law or regulation. The parties acknowledge that they each have been informed of and are familiar with the provisions of California Civil Code Section 1542 which provides:

"A general release does not extend to claims that the creditor or releasing party does not know or suspect to exist in his or her favor at the time of executing the release and that, if known by him or her, would have materially affected his or her settlement with the debtor or released party."

Further, the parties mutually waive the provisions of California Civil Code Section 1542, and further waive any right they might have to voice said provisions now or in the future with respect to the releases set out in this Agreement. The parties recognize and acknowledge that factors which have induced them to enter into this Compromise and Release may turn out to be incorrect or different to what they have previously anticipated, and the parties expressly assume the risks and further expressly assume the risk of this waiver of California Civil Code section 1542.

If this Agreement is terminated, this Section shall have no force and effect.

13. Remedies for Breach. In the event of a breach of this Agreement by GRANTOR, TAMC is entitled to pursue any and all remedies available to it against GRANTOR, including, without limitation, claims for all damages attributable to GRANTOR's breach, and specific performance of this Agreement.

14. Miscellaneous.

A. <u>Authority to sign; Approval of TAMC</u>. GRANTOR and the signatories represent and warrant that the signatories to this Agreement are authorized to enter into this Agreement to convey real property and that no other authorizations are required to implement this Agreement on behalf of GRANTOR.

GRANTOR understands that this Agreement is subject to the approval of TAMC, and this Agreement shall have no effect unless and until the Board approves it.

- B. <u>Counterparts Signature</u>. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be an original, but all counterparts shall constitute one agreement.
- C. <u>Specific Performance</u>. In the event of GRANTOR's breach of this Agreement, TAMC shall be entitled to pursue any and all remedies available to it, including, without limitation, claims for damages attributable to GRANTOR's breach, and specific performance of this Agreement.
- D. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. The parties have here set forth the whole of their agreement. The performance of this Agreement constitutes the entire consideration for the TCEs and shall relieve TAMC of all further obligations or claims on this account or on account of the location, grade, construction or operation of the proposed Project.
- E. <u>Binding on Successors and Assigns</u>. This Agreement shall be binding on and inure to the benefit of the respective heirs, successors and assigns of the parties.

1. CALL TO ORDER

Chair LeBarre called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m. Roll call was taken, and a quorum was confirmed.

Staff present: Guther, Kise, Muck, Rodriguez, Sambrano, Strause, Watson, and Zeller.

Others present: Robert Brayer, County Counsel; Paul Schlesinger and Jim Davenport, Thorn Run Partners; Gus Khouri, Khouri Consulting; and Lisa Rheinheimer, Monterey-Salinas Transit.

2. PUBLIC COMMENTS

No public comment

3. CONSENT AGENDA

On a motion by Committee Member Adams seconded by Committee Alternate Member Anderson, the Committee voted 6-0 to approve the minutes from the Executive Committee meeting of September 6, 2023.

4. LEGISLATIVE UPDATE & DRAFT 2024 PROGRAM

On a motion by Committee Member Potter seconded by Committee Member Adams, the Committee voted 6-0 to recommend the Board of Directors approve the draft 2024 legislative program for distribution to committees.

Christina Watson, Director of Planning, highlighted proposed edits to the draft 2024 legislative program.

Gus Khouri, Agency state legislative analyst, presented an update on state legislative activities. He noted that the Governor has until October 13 to veto or sign legislation.

Jim Davenport and Paul Schlesinger, Agency federal legislative analysts, presented an update on federal legislative activities. Mr. Davenport reported that the Continuing Resolution expires on November 17, noting they have six and a half weeks to get appropriations bills passed. The House will not start appropriations bill process until a new Speaker is elected. The Senate's federal fiscal year 2024 Transportation Housing and Urban Development (THUD) Bill includes a \$1.8 million earmark to construct a segment of the G12 Pajaro to Prunedale project. Mr. Shlesinger noted the newest Senator for CA was sworn in, and that Senator Butler will be in the job at least until the 2024 election to fill that seat. Chair LeBarre asked staff to draft a letter congratulating Senator Butler.

Ms. Watson outlined the parameters for federal fiscal year 2025 "Community Project Funding" (earmarks), setting the stage for a future discussion of potential projects to nominate for an earmark.

5. STATE TRANSIT AND ZERO EMISSION FUNDING PROJECT CANDIDATES

The Committee received information about state transit and zero emission funding and eligible projects.

Alissa Guther, Assistant Transportation Planner, reported on July 10, 2023, the Governor signed Senate Bill (SB) 125 into law, which included new formula funding through the Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP) and created a new Zero-Emission Transit Capital Program (ZETCP). TAMC is slated to receive \$44.5 million over two years in TIRCP formula funds and \$8 million over four years for the ZETCP.

Ms. Guther noted that if funds are to be applied to transit operations in fiscal year (FY) 2023-24, then TAMC must submit a regional short-term financial plan to demonstrate how the region will address any operational deficit using all available funds (besides SB125 funds) through FY 2025–26.

She noted that a maximum of 1% of the total SB 125 multi-year funding budget, or just shy of \$530,000, may be programmed by TAMC for administration of funding and planning expenses related to developing the long-term financial plan.

Director Muck noted that this is a unique program, in that once TAMC submits the project allocation request at the end of December, the state will allocate the funds to TAMC. TAMC can modify the project list after the allocation, which will create opportunities to fund projects as they develop, and other fund sources are brought in.

6. 2024 REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

The Committee received an update and provided input on the funding proposal for the 2024 Regional Transportation Improvement Program.

Janneke Strause, Transportation Planner, reported that the State Transportation Improvement Program is funded through state and federal gas taxes on a 5-year cycle. The fund estimate adopted by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) in August is for FY 2024/2024 – FY 2028/2029; Monterey County's share for the 5-year period is \$15,515,000. She noted that every two years in December, regions submit their project proposals in the form of the Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) to the CTC for approval in March the following year.

Ms. Strause reported that staff are proposing allocating funds to the Scenic State Route 68 corridor and US 101 South of Salinas corridor in the 2024 RTIP. The final proposal will go to the TAMC Board at their December meeting.

7. STATE LEGISLATIVE ADVOCATE SERVICES CONTRACT

On a motion by Committee Member Potter and seconded by Committee Member Adams, the Committee voted 6-0 to recommend the Board of Directors:

- Approve and authorize the Executive Director to extend the contract with Khouri Consulting for State legislative analyst/ advocate services, subject to approval by Agency Counsel, by two years, until October 31, 2025, adding One Hundred and Forty-Four Thousand Dollars (\$144,000) to the current contract for a total amended contract budget of Two Hundred and Eight-Eight Thousand Dollars (\$288,000);
- 2. Authorize the use of reserve funds budgeted to this project; and
- Authorize the Executive Director to take such other further actions as may be
 necessary to fulfill the intent of the contract, including approvals of future
 modifications or amendments that do not significantly alter the scope of work, or
 change the approved contract term or amount.

Christina Watson, Director of Planning, reported that staff recommends extending the current contract for another two years, expiring October 31, 2025. Staff recommends increasing the payment from \$4,000 per month, which was the rate for the three-year contract, to \$6,000 per month for the next two years. This new rate reflects the lack of a cost-of-living increase over that contract's duration and the increase in costs over the period of the contract.

Ms. Watson noted that Gus Khouri has done an excellent job representing TAMC for the past three years, including proactive and timely efforts on behalf of the Agency on multiple bills, grant applications and other funding issues. Mr. Khouri exhibits a depth of understanding of transportation issues and of Agency priorities. Mr. Khouri recently brought on Mitch Weiss to help him with his workload. Mitch was recently the Executive Director of the California Transportation Commission (CTC) and has an exceptional knowledge of transportation funding and finance.

Director Muck noted staff recognized we have been paying Mr. Khouri less than what other similar sized agencies pay him, noting staff is very happy with his performance. Chair LeBarre noted that Gus is knowledgeable and experienced. Committee Members Adams, Potter, and Poduri concurred.

- Zero Emission Buses
- Monterey Bay Microgrid & Hydrogen Electric Bus
- Salinas Valley Hydrogen Electric Bus

Ms. Guther noted that TAMC staff will bring a project list to the November Committee meeting for a recommendation to the Board.

Lisa Rheinheimer, MST Assistant General Manager & Deputy Treasurer, noted that four of the items on their project list will help MST achieve compliance with the unfunded mandate of a zero-emission fleet by 2040.

Committee members made the following comments and direction to staff:

- Consider how this funding can be best leveraged to set up the projects for future grant applications.
- Provide a recommended funding allocation to the November RPC that reflects a balance between rail and bus priorities and a regional perspective.

5. PAJARO MULTIMODAL STATION PROJECT UPDATE

The Committee received an update on Pajaro Multimodal Station Project.

Alissa Guther, Assistant Transportation Planner, reported that TAMC received \$2.3 million to fund environmental review documentation, subject to allocation by the California Transportation Commission on December 6.

Ms. Guther reported an update on the proposed October 13, 2023, lunch and site visit with the Santa Cruz County Regional Transportation Commission (SCCRTC) in Pajaro/Watsonville. She noted that it will not be a public meeting, but a meet-and-greet and a first step toward a more formal working relationship that will include public meetings in the future.

6. ANNOUNCEMENTS AND/OR COMMENTS FROM COMMITTEE MEMBERS

Christina Watson announced that TAMC is seeking nominations for the Transportation Excellence Awards that honor individuals, businesses, groups, or projects for their efforts to improve the transportation system in Monterey County. She noted that the deadline to submit a nomination is December 1, 2023.

Subject: Scenic Route 68 Corridor Improvement Project Community Engagement

Schedule

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

RECEIVE presentation and **PROVIDE INPUT** on the scheduled community engagement activities for the Scenic Route 68 Corridor Improvement Project.

SUMMARY:

Caltrans is preparing the Draft Environmental Document for the Scenic Route 68 Corridor Improvement Project and is scheduled to circulate this information by November 7, 2023. TAMC and Caltrans will co-host upcoming community engagement events.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The Scenic Route 68 Corridor Improvement Project was identified on the project list approved by Monterey voters as part of the Measure X initiative and was allocated \$50 million for project implementation. The environmental and design phases are fully-funded with State and federal funds. TAMC staff continues to research potential opportunities to leverage Measure X funds to finance the eventual construction of the entire project.

DISCUSSION:

State Route (SR) 68, between Josselyn Canyon Road and San Benancio Road (post miles 4.8 -13.7), is a heavily traveled portion of highway serving residents, businesses, and regional commuters along a scenic corridor (see Project Site Map, **attached**). Users of State Route 68 know that at times there is congestion on the corridor which results in significant travel delays and traffic safety concerns. The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) in partnership with TAMC recognized these challenges and conducted a thorough evaluation on safety and operations along State Route 68. This evaluation concluded that road users along this corridor regularly experience travel delays and there is minimal accommodation for non-motorized roadway users. The analysis also showed safety issues like collisions between vehicles that sometimes involved wildlife. The proposed Scenic Route 68 Corridor Improvement Project was identified to accomplish three objectives:

- Connect natural habitats using wildlife crossings under Highway 68;
- · Address safety concerns along the corridor; and
- Improve operations and traffic flow through each intersection.

The Scenic Route 68 Corridor Improvement Project proposes operational improvements and wildlife connectivity improvements along State Route 68 from 0.4 miles west of Josselyn Canyon Road (post

mile 4.8) to 0.4 miles east of San Benancio Road (post mile 13.7). Within the project limits, this segment of State Route 68 is classified as a two-lane undivided conventional highway with the exception of the segment between Corral de Tierra and San Benancio which has two-way left turn median channelization. The State Route 68 signalized intersections within the project limits have left turn lanes, auxiliary through lanes, and/or right turn lanes to accommodate the turning movements. The Draft Environmental Document for this project conducted thorough evaluations on the potential impacts of two alternatives that each include wildlife crossings at 5 locations:

- Alternative 1 proposes roundabouts at nine intersections replacing existing signalized operations; and
- 2. Alternative 2 proposes to expand existing signal systems and add Integrated Corridor Management and Adaptive Signal Control at intersections with existing signalized operations.

The Draft Environmental Document is scheduled to be circulated for public review no later than November 7, 2023. Current guidelines call for a review period that is at least 40 days in length, starting when the document is officially circulated for public review. This project will include a longer public review schedule that is expected to exceed 60 days. This schedule defines the time period that the public is allowed to submit formal comments on the draft environmental document.

The community engagements for this project are highlighted by three formal meetings co-hosted by TAMC and Caltrans to share project information with the public and solicit feedback on the information contained in the environmental document. These meetings will encourage the community to share concerns about the project's environmental impacts and allow formal comments to be submitted in response to the information provided in the document. These public meetings are scheduled to be held as follows:

- November 15, 3:00-7:00 pm at the MST Conference Center
- November 16, 4:30-7:00 pm at the Salinas Armory
- December 6, 12:00-3:00 at the Monterey Conference Center (time of event is subject to change)

The December 6 meeting will constitute the public hearing that is required for a project of this scale. During the public comment period of the draft environmental document, TAMC staff will be holding informal stakeholder meetings intended to ensure the communities impacted by the project are well-informed and understand the process required to submit formal comments on the environmental document. A project website is also being developed that will include a virtual workshop setting designed for community members to easily navigate through project information and submit their input on the project.


TAMC conducted a series of public outreach events in 2016 and 2017. These meetings led to a general consensus that the project should include a roundabout alternative with a hybrid design similar in function to the roundabout recently constructed at the intersection of Highway 1 and Highway 68 near the entrance to Pebble Beach. Caltrans staff has subsequently determined that a second alternative should be included in the environmental document that maintains the signalized operations at each intersection, and that a single-lane roundabout design is recommended per current Caltrans guidelines (except at the intersection of State Route 218 where a two-lane roundabout configuration is proposed).

Subject: 2024 Regional Transportation Improvement Program

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

RECEIVE update and **PROVIDE INPUT** on the funding proposal for the 2024 Regional Transportation Improvement Program.

SUMMARY:

To ensure efficient coordination among various fund sources, the 2023 Integrated Funding Strategy identifies projects that are strong candidates for specific Senate Bill 1 grants, State Transportation Improvement Program funds, Measure X, and other matching funds, and can be brought to construction within the next five years. As a subset of that plan, the Regional Transportation Improvement Program specifies the region's proposed use of certain State funds to the California Transportation Commission.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The Transportation Agency for Monterey County's target share per the 2024 State Transportation Improvement Program Fund Estimate is \$15,515,000.

DISCUSSION:

Several of the strategic goals identified by the Transportation Agency Board of Directors are to deliver the Measure X regional program of projects, while leveraging as many matching funds as possible. With the passage of California Senate Bill 1 (Beall), several new transportation funding programs were created from which the Transportation Agency will be able to leverage Measure X and other existing fund sources. To ensure coordination between the various fund sources, which all have different requirements and eligibility, the Transportation Agency prepared the 2023 Integrated Funding Strategy that coincides with the 2024 State Transportation Improvement Program cycle.

The Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) is a program of highway, local road, transit and active transportation projects that a region plans to fund with State and Federal revenue programmed by the California Transportation Commission in the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). The RTIP is developed biennially by the regions and is due to the Commission by December 15 of every odd numbered year.

The Transportation Agency staff's funding proposal for the 2024 Regional Transportation Improvement Program reflects TAMC's dedication to improving statewide and regional travel by constructing high-priority highway, regional road, rail, and bicycle and pedestrian transportation projects throughout the region. To that end, Transportation Agency staff recommend projects to program in the 2024 Regional Transportation Improvement Program that are moving through

preconstruction phases; are in the adopted or draft Sustainable Communities Strategy; and are excellent candidates for the Senate Bill 1 grant programs.

The 2023 Integrated Funding Strategy project list was approved by the Transportation Agency Board at the May 24, 2023 meeting. The attached project list (Attachment 1) is a modified version showing the new project funding information. A summary of staff's new funding recommendations follows (new programming is underlined):

Scenic State Route 68 Corridor: This project received \$3.4 million of State Transportation Improvement Program funds in fiscal year 2018/19, along with \$2.6 million of federal Highway Infrastructure Program funds, for the environmental phase, and \$640,000 of Measure X. In FY 2022/2023, the project received an additional \$1,949,000 of Senate Bill 1 Local Partnership Formula funds, \$799,000 Highway Infrastructure Program funds, and \$2,087,000 of 2022 State Transportation Improvement Program funds for the environmental phase. The final design phase is programmed in the State Transportation Improvement Program with \$23,516,000. Initial estimates for the construction of the first set of three intersections is \$63 million and agency staff is proposing to use \$6.3 million of Measure X and \$6.3 million of the 2024 State Transportation Improvement Program as a match for a potential future \$50 million Senate Bill 1 Congested Corridors grant in fiscal year 2025/26.

US 101 South of Salinas Corridor: This project was programmed with \$8,611,000 in fiscal year 2021/22 and \$1,378,000 in fiscal year 2022/23 of State Transportation Improvement Program funds for the environmental phase. <u>Staff is proposing to program \$8,036,000 of Measure X and \$8,964,000 of 2024 State Transportation Improvement Program funds in fiscal year 2024/25 to fully-fund the <u>PS&E phase</u>. Caltrans has the option to request these funds in an earlier fiscal year if the project moves ahead of schedule.</u>

Planning, Programming, and Monitoring: In each State Transportation Improvement Program cycle, funds are available to the Transportation Agency for Planning, Programming, and Monitoring activities. Eligible activities include:

- Regional transportation planning, including the development and preparation of the regional transportation plan.
- Project planning, including the development of project study reports or major investment studies, conducted by regional agencies or by local agencies in cooperation with regional agencies.
- Program development, including the preparation of RTIPs and studies supporting them.
- Monitoring the implementation of STIP projects, including project delivery, timely use of funds, and compliance with State law and the Commission's guidelines.

The Transportation Agency has \$512,000 in new funding available for fiscal years 2024/25 through 2027/28 and \$253,000 in fiscal year 2028/29. Staff is proposing to program \$75,000 (with \$202,000 of existing funds) in fiscal year 2024/25, \$80,000 (with \$197,000 of existing funds) in 2025/26, \$81,000 (with \$196,000 of existing funds) in 2026/27, \$276,000 in 2027/28, and \$253,000 in 2028/29.

Agency staff will revise the plan based on comments received at the October Board meeting. At the December Board meeting, Agency staff will bring the finalized proposal forward as the Regional Transportation Improvement Program, which is the document the Agency is required to submit in order to receive the County's share of State Transportation Improvement Program funds.

Subject: 2026 Regional Transportation Plan Update

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

2026 Regional Transportation Plan Update:

- 1. **RECEIVE** presentation on the process and timeline for the 2026 Regional Transportation Plan; and
- 2. **PROVIDE INPUT** regarding the Plan's development.

SUMMARY:

Every four years, the Transportation Agency is responsible for developing an updated Regional Transportation Plan, pursuant to State and federal transportation planning requirements. The Agency has initiated work on the 2026 Regional Transportation Plan and staff will present a timeline of the plan process, and seek input for the draft goals and policy objectives.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The 2026 Regional Transportation Plan is being prepared in-house by staff in coordination with Agency committees and the Board of Directors. The Plan's environmental document is budgeted by the Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments not to exceed \$325,000, of which TAMC will pay \$75,000, and will cover the tri-county Metropolitan Transportation Plan as well as the individual Monterey, Santa Cruz and San Benito County Regional Transportation Plans. The Plan will include cost estimates for transportation projects in Monterey County through the 2050 horizon year. The 2022 Regional Transportation Plan's financial estimate identified a total of approximately \$6.7 billion in projected funding for transportation projects in Monterey County through the 2045 horizon year of the plan.

DISCUSSION:

The Regional Transportation Plan for Monterey County is a long range (20+ year) plan, updated every four years. The Regional Transportation Plan forms the basis for the Metropolitan Transportation Plan prepared by the Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments (AMBAG) for the Monterey Bay Area pursuant to Federal Highway Administration and Caltrans transportation planning requirements. As the Metropolitan Planning Organization for the Monterey Bay Area, AMBAG incorporates the financial assumptions and project lists included in the Regional Transportation Plans for Monterey, Santa Cruz and San Benito Counties into the Metropolitan Transportation Plan.

Pursuant to state and federal guidelines, the Regional Transportation Plan includes a countywide

multi-modal needs assessment, transportation policy element, long-range funding forecast, funding-constrained project list, and a program-level environmental review document assessing the probable environmental impacts associated with implementation of the Plan. Public participation is sought after in the development of the Regional Transportation Plan for each of the project steps, and as adopted by AMBAG through the Monterey Bay Area Public Participation Plan.

Staff has initiated the development of updated goals and policy objectives for the 2026 Regional Transportation Plan. Staff reviewed the draft 2024 Regional Transportation Plan Guidelines and began revising the Plan's 2026 goals and policy objectives to be more reflective of current projects and programs happening in Monterey County. Staff recommends aligning the 2026 RTP with the following overarching goals:

- Access & Mobility
- Safety & Health
- Climate Adaptation
- Equity
- Economic Vitality

Proposed modifications to the 2022 goals and policy objectives include greater emphasis on geographic equity, integration of public health/health equity, climate resiliency and adaptation, and direct reflection of Measure X projects and programs, such as Safe Routes to Schools and the participatory budgeting program. Staff requests that the Board provide input on regional priorities following the overview presentation. Staff developed a draft timeline to provide stakeholders with an overview on the Monterey County's Regional Transportation Plan process. The projected schedule of activities include:

- Jan. 2024: TAMC Board Action: Adoption of Goals, Policy Objectives and Performance Measures.
- Jan March 2024: TAMC to develop updated project and program cost estimates in collaboration with the cities and the County.
- April 2024: TAMC to present the draft project list and cost estimates to the Technical Advisory Committee.
- Jan/Feb 2025: TAMC Board Action: Adoption of final project list.
- Dec. 2025: TAMC Board Action: Receive draft Regional Transportation Plan and release notice to the public for review/comment.
- Dec. 2025: AMBAG to release Draft Environmental Impact Report for the Metropolitan Transportation Plan for public review and comment.
- June 2026: TAMC Board Action: Approval of Final Regional Transportation Plan, adoption of CEQA findings and adoption of the joint Environmental Impact Report.

The legislative program continues a focus on preserving and seeking transportation funding.

DISCUSSION:

Agency State legislative analyst Gus Khouri will present an update on State legislative activities, staff will present an update on Federal legislative activities, and staff will request input for the Agency legislative program for 2024.

Attachment 1 is a State legislative update and **Attachment 2** is the State bill list showing the current status of State legislation and whether the bills are signed, dead, or awaiting the Governor's signature (he has until October 14 to veto or sign legislation, past the deadline for this report). Key bills signed into law include:

- <u>Senate Bill (SB) 304 (Laird): Monterey-Salinas Transit District</u>: public contracting, which
 increases from \$100,000 to \$150,000 the monetary threshold for MST to award contracts for
 the purchase of supplies, materials, and equipment, to the lowest responsible bidder, or to the
 responsible bidder that provides the best value.
- SB 825 (Limon): Local Government: public broadband services, which adds metropolitan
 planning organizations and regional transportation planning authorities to the list of local
 government agencies included in the definition of "local agency" eligible to directly apply for
 local technical assistance grants administered by the California Public Utilities Commission for
 implementation of broadband.

Attachment 3 is a federal legislative end-of-year report and **Attachment 4** is a memo from Thorn Run Partners, "Planning for FY 2025 Community Funded Projects (aka Earmarks)".

RE: STATE LEGISLATIVE UPDATE – SEPTEMBER

General Update

The first year of the 2023-24 concluded on September 14. Governor Newsom will have until October 14 to sign or veto legislation pending on his desk. Legislators will return on January 3 to commence the second year of session.

New Senate President pro Tempore

On August 28, it was announced that Senator Mike McGuire (North Coast) will become the 52nd California State Senate President pro Tempore. He will succeed Toni Atkins (San Diego), who is termed out in 2024 and will be running for Governor in 2026 when Governor Newsom is also termed out. Senator Atkins will join a field expected to include Lieutenant Governor Eleni Kounalakis and Attorney General Rob Bonta. McGuire, who will term out in 2026, has been a strong advocate on transportation issues, including his work on SB 1, the \$5 billion annual transportation package that provides a broad array of investments into passenger rail, highways, and local streets and roads.

<u>California Transportation Commission Needs Assessment</u>

SB 1121, Chapter 508, Statutes of 2022, requires the California Transportation Commission (CTC), in consultation with the California State Transportation Agency (CalSTA) and Caltrans, to prepare a needs assessment of the cost to operate, maintain, and provide for the necessary future growth of the state and local transportation system for the next ten years. This represents an opportunity for TAMC to identify priority projects for future funding consideration. The Interim Transportation Needs Assessment is due to the Legislature on or before January 1, 2024. The Completed Transportation Needs Assessment is due on or before January 1, 2025, and every five years thereafter.

Bills of Interest

Assembly Constitutional Amendment (ACA) 1 (Aguiar-Curry) would authorize a local government, including a special district, to impose, extend, or increase a sales and use tax or transactions and use tax, or a parcel tax, imposed to fund the construction, rehabilitation, or replacement of public infrastructure, defined to include improvements to transit and streets and highways and projects for the protection of property from the impacts of sea level rise, as well as for affordable housing, if the proposition proposing that tax is approved by 55% of its voters. **Status:** Governor's Desk

ACA 13 (Ward) requires an initiative constitutional amendment to comply with any increased voter approval threshold that it seeks to impose on future ballot measures. Guarantees in the state constitution the ability of local governments to submit advisory questions to voters. This measure is a response to the California Business Roundtable's initiative to make all tax thresholds to be set at a 2/3 vote margin. **Status:** Governor's Desk.

Caltrans System Investment Strategy (CSIS)

Per executive orders N-19-19 and N-76-20 issued by Governor Newsom in 2019 and 2020, CalSTA has been attempting to implement the Climate Action Plan for Transportation Infrastructure (CAPTI, 2021). CAPTI supports the "California Transportation Plan 2050" (2021) goals that work to meet the State's ambitious climate change mandates, targets, and policies. The CTP 2050 is the state's broad vision for the future of California's transportation system, focusing on advancing equity and climate priorities by expanding travel options for all Californians.

Additionally, CAPTI aligns with Caltrans 2020-24 Strategic Plan (2021), which signals a fundamental shift for Caltrans to lead climate action as a strategic priority for the first time. Caltrans is in a significant leadership role to carry out meaningful measures that advance the state's goals and priorities by developing and implementing the Caltrans System Investment Strategy (CSIS).

The CSIS implementation is envisioned as an investment framework through a data- and_performance-driven approach that guides transportation investments and decisions. This framework includes methodologies and processes for how Caltrans should invest billions of dollars in highly competitive fund programs to address transportation deficiencies while achieving the CAPTI goals of reducing single-occupant vehicles and vehicle miles traveled and encouraging mode shift to transit and active transportation. Caltrans seeks to leverage state and federal funds to accelerate investments into mass transit, bicycle and pedestrian programs, and zero-emission infrastructure. This effort may impact the delivery of transportation projects on the statewide system. Further clarification is needed on project eligibility and implications of delivering on TAMC's priorities through the Measure X expenditure plans.

With Congress still in session and business pertinent to TAMC still unfinished, it is not possible to provide a definitive summation of the year. However, progress has been made on obtaining funding for TAMC's Pajaro to Prunedale Project, which is slated to receive \$1,811,000 in the fiscal year (FY) 2024 Senate Transportation and Housing and Urban Development (THUD) Appropriations bill. Notably, the project is one of just two highway projects included in the bill for the entire State. TAMC staff prepared excellent documentation and application materials in support of the request. Moreover, TAMC did an exemplary job of gaining support for the project from several entities throughout the region.

The Pajaro to Prunedale project failed to advance in the House, given it was not submitted to the House Appropriations Committee by Representatives Jimmy Panetta or Zoe Lofgren. We also submitted the project to Senators Dianne Feinstein and Alex Padilla, and with Senator Padilla's leadership and advocacy, the project was included in the Senate THUD bill. The Senate THUD bill is one of three bills currently pending consideration in the Senate in the form of a minibus – a conglomeration of three separate appropriations bills. While we strongly believe Congress will eventually pass the FY 2024 THUD appropriations bill, the timing is uncertain. House Republicans are mired in a political mess of their own creation over spending levels, with a small group of Freedom Caucus members holding up appropriations bills and a continuing resolution, which must be passed before September 30th so the Federal government can continue operating, while Congress completes its work, and the Administration enacts FY 24 appropriations bills.

Completion of the FY 24 bills will be no easy task given the House and Senate bills are so vastly different, with the Senate sticking to spending levels that were agreed upon by Congress and the Administration, and the House aiming to significantly cut spending for most federal programs. For instance, the House THUD bill includes an 82 percent cut to the Capital Investment Grants (CIG) for transit projects, funding the program at \$392 million, while the Senate funds CIG at \$2.45 billion. The House bill also eliminates the Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) program, which has been a popular, oversubscribed grant program that was created under President Obama's leadership. The Senate fully funds RAISE at \$800 million. The House also cuts nearly two thirds of Amtrak's budget.

While much of our focus has been on obtaining funding for TAMC through the appropriations process, the Administration continued to provide several new funding opportunities that were authorized as part of the 2021 Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA). A hallmark of the legislation, also known as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL), was the truly dramatic increase in the amount of funds that were authorized to be implemented through discretionary grants, of which there was a similarly dramatic increase in number. Notices of Funding Opportunities for most of the new programs have been issued, including: Safe Streets for All, Bridge Investment Program, Charging and Fueling Infrastructure (i.e., electric vehicle chargers), RAISE, and Reconnecting Communities, to name a few. We have provided briefing papers on most of these new transportation grants, and brought them to the Agency's attention upon release of their Notices of Funding Opportunity (NOFOs).

We were pleased to assist in securing Congressional support for various federal and state grant applications the Agency pursued.

Additionally, we were pleased to assist with the scheduling and staffing of a trip to Washington for a TAMC Board Member that was timely in providing input on the Hill in support of our Pajaro to Prunedale funding request.

We provided staff with information on procedures and timing for securing funding for the US 101 auxiliary lane earmark that TAMC received from Congress in 2022.

In addition, we have apprised TAMC staff of other, more general developments related to transportation policy and legislation, including Justice 40 implementation, pandemic relief spending flexibility, and tolling project impacts, to name a few. Moreover, we have assisted with preparation of, and participated in, Board and Executive Committee meetings as requested, and provided TAMC with the TRP daily Tip Sheet.



PLANNING FOR FY 2025 COMMUNITY FUNDED PROJECTS (AKA EARMARKS)

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Anticipating that many members of the House and Senate will once again solicit Community Funded Project requests (also known as earmarks) for the Fiscal Year (FY) 2025 appropriations process beginning early next year, now is a good time to begin planning for what project(s) you may want to request. While we do not know exactly what the process will look like, how many projects Members may be able to request on behalf of constituents, which Members may or may not participate, or when deadlines may occur, it is prudent to begin brainstorming now.

Note that the President's budget is expected to be released in February 2024, which is typically the kick-off to the discussion of funding the government for the coming fiscal year. Also, FY 2024 funding has yet to be resolved by Congress, including any earmarks that may be in those draft House or Senate bills. Even with those caveats, requests to participating members of Congress and Senators may still be due as early as February or as late as April.

Below is information the House Appropriations Committee provided this year to guide requests. Until we have new information, this is the best guidance to help think of ideas for FY 2025. We can also pull projects that were funded in the draft FY 2024 bills if you would like additional examples or ideas.

INFORMATION NEEDED FOR REQUESTS

Like the last few years, all requests will require us to fill out forms with your assistance with information. Beyond that, we will need letters of support at a minimum, but the Committee in the past suggested these other types of community support identifiers may be helpful:

- Press articles highlighting the need for the requested Community Project Funding;
- Support from newspaper editorial boards;
- Letters from regional elected officials;
- Projects listed on State intended use plans, community development plans, or other publicly available planning documents; or
- Resolutions passed by city councils or boards.
