4. MONTEREY TRAFFIC SYSTEM, PEDESTRIAN, AND BIKE UPDATE

The Committee received a presentation on traffic system, pedestrian, and bike projects in the City of Monterey.

Marissa Garcia, Public Works Engineer for the City of Monterey, reported that the City of Monterey is enhancing its traffic signal control with an advanced adaptive traffic signal system aimed at easing traffic flow and reducing congestion. She noted that this initiative is especially important for bike and pedestrian committee members as it promises to improve safety and navigation throughout the city for cyclists and walkers. She noted that the system, which adjusts traffic lights in real time based on current conditions, is already making a difference on six major roads, with plans to expand further. She noted that this approach not only speeds up vehicle movement but also ensures safer, more predictable crossings for pedestrians and cyclists. Ms. Garcia noted that this project stands as a pivotal step towards enhancing the city's infrastructure to support a vibrant, active community where walking and biking are safer and more enjoyable.

The Committee had the following comments and input on the city of Monterey traffic system, pedestrian, and bike update:

- Consider working on the signals for traffic crossing Lighthouse.
- Consider public outreach.

5. FORTAG LAGUNA GRANDE CONNECTIVITY PROJECT

The Committee provided feedback on focused engagement strategies for the Laguna Grande segment of the Fort Ord Regional Trail and Greenway (FORTAG) project.

Amelia Conlen, Senior Transportation Planner, reported that Transportation Agency staff are preparing an application for funding through Cycle 7 of the Active Transportation Program (ATP) for the Laguna Grande segment of the Fort Ord Regional Trail and Greenway (FORTAG) project. She noted that staff is brainstorming to develop effective outreach strategies that can be included in the ATP grant application. One of the essential criteria for the ATP grant is to demonstrate that the project area serves a disadvantaged community. Ms. Conlen noted that the objective is to enhance bike and pedestrian infrastructure and quality of life.

The Committee had the following comments and input on the Fort Ord Regional Trail and Greenway project:

- Consider having the survey link available at libraries.
- Consider surveys available at grocery stores, parks, and churches.
- Consider a booth at the Sea Otter Classic.
- Consider adding link to survey on the "NextDoor" platform.
- Consider coordinating with Seaside Police Department on education and giving out pamphlets information and bike lights.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

SUMMARY:

The Fort Ord Regional Trail & Greenway (FORTAG) is part of a larger effort to connect communities in and around the former Fort Ord to each other and to education, employment, community, and open space. The project is a proposed 28-mile regional active transportation corridor and is included as a regional priority in Measure X. The project received State environmental clearance in March 2020, and the Agency has been pursuing grant opportunities to construct the project in segments.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Adjusted for inflation, Measure X is contributing \$24 million to FORTAG. Construction for the Canyon Del Rey/SR 218 Segment is projected to cost \$17.9 million and is fully funded with a \$9.8 million Active Transportation Program grant and \$8.1 million of Measure X. Segment 2 between Imjin Road and the Jerry Smith Access Corridor received a \$7.1 million Federal Lands Access Program grant and \$5.1 million in Measure X. Segment 3 runs adjacent to California Avenue between the City of Marina and CSUMB received a \$7.5 million Active Transportation Program Cycle 6 grant matched with \$2 million of Measure X.

DISCUSSION:

FORTAG is proposed as an approximately 28-mile continuous 12-ft wide paved bicycle and pedestrian trail with an open-space buffer on both sides. FORTAG will connect to the existing Monterey Bay Sanctuary Scenic Trail and will provide connections to unpaved trails in the Fort Ord National Monument. The northern loop of FORTAG encircles Marina, following a 13-mile route that includes 3 miles of the existing Monterey Bay Coastal Trail. The southern loop of FORTAG encircles Seaside and bisects Del Rey Oaks, following a 15-mile route that includes 4 miles of the existing Monterey Bay Coastal Trail. The route includes spurs connecting with existing and planned bike/pedestrian infrastructure. Several sections of the paved trail will link to nearby unpaved trails. There are currently four segments in progress:

Segment 1 - Canyon Del Rey/SR 218

Phase 1 of the Canyon Del Rey/State Route 218 Segment involves construction of the trail through the City of Del Rey Oaks from Fremont Boulevard to Del Rey Woods Elementary in the City of Seaside. From Fremont Boulevard, the trail will run along State Route 218 and then move behind Safeway through Work Memorial Park traveling around the tennis courts and towards Angelus Way. There are no improvements proposed along Angelus Way based on feedback from the community. The trail will pick up again at Del Rey Park and travel towards State Route 218 along the existing trail. An undercrossing below State Route 218 will connect near Del Rey Oaks City Hall and the Frog Pond. A raised pathway will be constructed to connect trail users from the undercrossing to Carlton Drive at an accessible grade. The trail will extend northeast up Carton Drive to Plumas Avenue. Along Carlton Drive the trail will consist of a new 12-foot wide multi-use sidewalk on the west side of the road, which will continue along Plumas Avenue up to Del Rey Woods Elementary.

This segment has completed final design and received an allocation of construction funding from the California Transportation Commission. The award of the construction contract is in process and construction is expected to begin in the summer of 2024.

Segment 2 - Imjin Road to Jerry Smith Corridor

FORTAG Segment 2 - Imjin Road to the Jerry Smith Corridor was awarded funding through the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) Federal Lands Access Program (FLAP) grant program. The project will provide a multi-use trail in Marina, between Imjin Parkway / Imjin Road connecting to the Jerry Smith Trailhead. The project involves final design and construction of 2.25 miles of a multi-use bike and pedestrian trail. The path will be paved to 12' wide with 2' unpaved shoulders on each side. Safety improvements include grading to create an Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant trail and enhanced road crossings. The purpose of this segment of the multi-use trail is to provide direct active transportation access to the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Fort Ord National Monument from California State University, Monterey Bay (CSUMB) and nearby Marina residents.

The project is currently at 30% final design, and has construction funding programmed in 2027. Agency staff is working closely with FHWA through this process to complete final design and deliver the project earlier if funds become available.

Segment 3 - California Avenue from Patton Parkway to Imjin Road

Transportation Agency staff was awarded an Active Transportation Program Cycle 6 grant to fund another portion of the CSUMB Loop North Segment, which closes the gap on California Avenue between the City of Marina and CSUMB, and connects to FORTAG Segment 2. The proposed project is a 1.4-mile shared use path that will be 12-feet wide and accommodate bicyclists, pedestrians, runners, scooters, or other shared mobility devices. The project is a gap closure that will vastly improve a current route and remove barriers to mobility. The project will close a gap in the existing regional network between the City of Marina and CSUMB to the north and south, and Fort Ord Trail network and the Monterey Bay Coastal Trail to the east and west. Currently, there is a Class II bikeway on California Ave, but due to the high speed limit (40 mph) for road traffic, the bike facility is not adequate for all ages and abilities. California Ave. as it is today, is itself a barrier for City of Marina residents, families, and students to be connected to the existing regional network, healthy food options, higher education, and open spaces. The project will fill this gap and will provide an all ages and abilities connection between the City of Marina, CSUMB, future development, the Fort Ord Trail system, and the Monterey Bay Coastal Trail via Class I bikeways.

This segment is currently in final design with construction funding programmed in fiscal year 2024/25.

Segment 4 - Laguna Grande Regional Park

The FORTAG Laguna Grande segment is 0.8-miles and includes a signalized pedestrian crossing, a 12-foot paved path in Laguna Grande Regional Park, and 675 feet of trail on Fremont Boulevard. This segment closes three gaps in the regional bicycle and pedestrian network and will connect disadvantaged communities in the Seaside to elementary schools, employment centers in Monterey, and recreation opportunities. The FORTAG Laguna Grande segment will also connect to the Canyon Del Rey segment of FORTAG, a 1.5-mile segment which runs alongside State Route 218 through three parks and ends at Del Rey Woods Elementary School. Agency staff are in the process of

preparing a state Active Transportation Program grant application for the upcoming Cycle 7.



SUMMARY:

The Walk and Roll Testimonials project would replace the Golden Helmet Award. Instead of annually awarding individual bicycle advocates and commuters, testimonial videos would highlight personal stories from the Monterey County community that could be shared online, on social media and through Transportation Agency programming. This initiative aims to capture and share diverse experiences to normalize and encourage more active transportation. Transportation Agency staff are seeking input on this proposal.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

There is no financial impact associated with the recommended action.

DISCUSSION:

The Golden Helmet Award was started in 2010 in an effort to recognize Monterey County residents for their dedication to bicycling. The aim of this award was to highlight the benefits of bicycle commuting and inspire others to utilize alternative transportation modes. Over the years, the Golden Helmet Award was successful in recognizing bicycle advocates in the community, but not so much in increasing rates of walking and bicycling in Monterey County. As bicycle advocates can be awarded a Transportation Agency Excellence Award, which is an annual program recognizing the efforts of the local community for outstanding efforts to improve transportation in Monterey County, the Golden Helmet Award is a duplicative effort.

In an attempt to increase rates of walking and bicycling, Transportation Agency staff are proposing to replace the Golden Helmet Award programming with "Walk & Roll Testimonials" programming. The project would feature a series of video testimonials from community members including families, students, and local commuters who walk and/or roll in their daily lives. The videos would be used in social media campaigns and other promotional activities to highlight the benefits and joys of biking and walking.

TAMC staff is requesting feedback from the Bicycle & Pedestrian Facilities Advisory Committee on the project concept and details such as:

- Who should be represented in the videos?
- What messages should come through in the videos?
- How long should the videos be?
- Are there Committee members who can help with the project?
